PARK STAGE FEES ARE REDUCED BY OFFICIAL ORDER

The secretary of the interior has approved a radical change in stage schedules for Crater Lake national park for the season of 1929. The round trip fare from rail terminals to the park and return are reduced from \$17.50 to \$12, and Chiloquin has been added as a new stage gateway.

The new rate is exceedingly low, the round trip mileage being 76 miles via Chiloquin, 124 miles via Klamath Falls and 164 miles via Medford. These low rates, together with the special railroad rates made by the Southern Pacific, are certain to increase railroad and stage travel into Oregon's national park. As an added attraction, travelers will have the option of coming in through any gateway, and going out the same or any other route. Each of the three gateways has a distinct charm, and it is thought that this option will be taken advantage of by thousands of customers who thus gain a better impression of Oregon's scenic and climatic diversities.
