FARMERS' WHOLESALE BUILDING UNDER WAY

A building, one story high and 20x16 feet in dimensions, is under construction on the Pacific highway near the Merriman dairy which will be used as a depot for the distribution of groceries in wholesale lots to Jackson county farmers. It will be known as the "Farmers' Wholesale," according to Mike P. Hanley, well known local farmer and stockman, upon whose land the structure is being erected.

Mr. Hanley denied any connection with the project, but said "A farmer can buy all he wants from an armload to a trainload." He said frequent shipments by trucks from Portland would be made and that shipments of stock would also be brought over from Crescent City.

Mr. Hanley said that the object of the Farmers' Wholesale was "to cut out the overhead and reduce the cost." He further stated that Frank G. Wilson was head of the business, but Mr. Hanley did not know his backers, if any. He said a corps of three solicitors were now engaged in the rural trade and that orders were taken for supplies in wholesale lots. The orders will be stored at the depot until the purchasers call for them.

Mr. Hanley was not very comminative about the proposition, but ventured the opinion, "We will see how this works and if we need a bigger depot one will be built."

TICKETS ON SALE FOR ALLEY MATCH

CONCRETE TESTER IN USE FOR CITY

The concrete testing machine recently bought for \$875 by the city of Medford from the Ashland city government, which had been used by the latter while its new water works dam was being built by that city, has been received and installed in the municipal warehouse on Jackson street and is now being put to its first local use in the construction of the new city fire station on Front street.

While the city purchased the machine primarily for use in testing all concrete that goes into the streets, bridges and municipally constructed buildings, City Superintendent Fred Scheffel announced today that it will be available to all contractors, architects or anyone else connected with the building of warehouses and other structures, who want to test samples of concrete.
