TAXI MAN FACING FORUM LUNCHEON DRUNKEN DRIVING HEARS PLANS FOR CHARGE IN COURT CLUB'S BUILDING

The trial of L. H. Watkins, a taxi driver, charged with driving while intoxicated, was under way today before a jury in Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor's court, the session being held in the circuit court room.

Watkins is alleged to have driven his cab in a reckless manner while intoxicated in the early morning of January 19, being halted after a chase by Officer Paul in another car at Eighth and Front streets. A field snow had fallen that morning, making it easy to track the Watkins car, which had a wheel cut off, according to prosecution witness testimony.

The taxi stopped in front of the Louis Super Service station and it was asserted from the stand that Watkins "was slumped down alongside the wheel, and that his knees failed to hold him up."

Girls in their teens were called as witnesses in the case.

The jury is composed of E. W. Differend, Col. Payne, Luke Ryan, Arthur H. Hill, W. W. Gregory and Roy Pruitt.

The defendant is represented by Kelly & Kelly and the state by Deputy Prosecutor George W. Neilson.
