

OREGON SCORES 'GOB' AND 'PEACH' PATTON LEADING EASY VICTORY OVER STATERS

Webfoots Pile Up Early Lead. While Losers Use to Quintets — Frosh Defeat Rooks Decisively — Other Coast Games.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP)—The University of Oregon Webfoots followed to an easy victory over the Oregon State college team tonight, 39 to 21. The Webfoots piled up a 19 point lead before the Aggies scored, the score at half time being 29 to 15.

Bill Reinhart, Webfoot coach, says the line-up for this northern division of the Pacific coast football season, starting Saturday, Oct. 22, at Eugene, at center and Jack Berger, sophomore at forward. Eberhart was the keyman on the attack in the first half and when Gordon Ridings, veteran forward who led the northern conference scores last fall, went into the game late in the initial period, the Oregon team started a scoring rampage.

Oregon State used two complete quintets in the first half in an effort to stop the Oregonians but not one of the combinations of Shute Hill, coach, used could turn the trick. Conversion of fourth favored the Oregon marksmen and connected for eight while the best the Oregon State could do was one.

The two teams will meet in Eugene Saturday.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Advance arrangements for the Sharky Stripling fight entered their second phase today—actual preparation of the participants themselves for the battle at Miami Beach February 27.

FUR-BEARING FISH OF GLACIER PARK TOLD IN LETTER

A copy of an astounding discovery of interest to Medford people generally and especially to fishermen, bearing the signature of L. H. Hickon, Whitefish, Mont., describing Hickman's Fur-Bearing Fish, is in circulation locally and is being read with much interest, as follows:

The discovery of the fur-bearing fish was made while traveling through Glacier National park during a sudden drop in temperature, following up of which led to "Teberb Lake," located near Whitefish, Mont. Several hooks were tried, but were, broken immediately upon touching the water. Finally, one was hooked, and when this one hit the water, the temperature tapered the hook, with the result that one of these fish was caught.

The water in this lake is so cold that nature had provided the fish with a thick coat of fur, in fact, the water is so cold that it is beyond freezing point.

The house, a very rare specimen, is found only on islands and live on the hum of the humming bird. They were found to be the only but that these fish would bite except in extreme warm weather, when it has been found that they will bite on "ice worms."

Another peculiarity of these fish is that they follow the precepts of the poet, who said: "In the spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love." So, with these fish, and during this period with a portable phonograph, by putting on a love song the fish will come to the surface, and the quick transfer to a jazz record results in their shaking themselves to death, when they can be picked out of the water.

It has been found that this fish absolutely refuses to bite during the "love" month of June, but, as there is always a black sheep in every family, the one fish caught (picture of which has been taken) disgraced himself before the entire family and suffered the usual penalty.

They make a rare fight, in landing them out of the water, due to the fact that nature has provided them with this fur, which ruffles and causes such a resistance that it is practically impossible to land them only under the most favorable circumstances. The fur also acts as an accelerator, and when they step on the gas with their tail and thus they speed in beyond any known fish at the present time. This, in turn, also acts as a brake in reducing speed at stopping, by simply putting the fur against the grain.
