

**BRITISH PRELATE
URGES SALVATION
CHIEF TO RETIRE**

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The personality of Baron Davidson, retired archbishop of Canterbury, entered the Salvation Army situation today when it became known that the aged prelate had sent a letter to General Bramwell Booth, suggesting that retirement would be a good way out of the general's difficulties.

It was at first reported that Baron Davidson might be made a mediator in the dispute between the commander and the high council of the army. But both the international headquarters of the Q organization and the headquarters of the American delegation to the council disclaimed knowledge of any such move. It was indicated that it would hardly be welcome, if made.

The letter from the former archbishop, it was said by a high army authority, urged peace on his aged co-worker in religion. The epistle pointed out that the general, like the writer of the letter, was and tired from the life-long service to humanity. It was therefore meant that they should both relinquish their work to younger hands.

Baron Davidson, it was said, described the happiness which he was enjoying in retirement and suggested that General Booth also could find joy and beauty and peace if he would give up his active work.

The letter was said to be lengthy but there was no information given out as to its text. The family of General Bramwell Booth declined to comment about it and so did Baron Davidson.

"To them this is our message on this earth. We are going home and we will be waiting to welcome you where there is no more sorrow."

Through a drizzling rain a small group followed the body of Mrs. LeBouef to the cemetery at Morgan City where she was buried beside the body of her husband, James J. LeBouef, slain 19 months ago.

At about the same time the body of Dr. Dreher was being buried at Clinton.

Funeral services for Mrs. LeBouef were held yesterday at Franklin and then the body was brought here to the home of her brother, Emory Bonner.

"There is an innocent girl," Mrs. Virginia Bonner, her sister mother murmured as friends passed by the casket. She has never believed her daughter guilty.

The house at Morgan City in which Dr. Dreher lived still bore his gold lettered name on the door. His widow and two daughters went to Clinton for the funeral. Services were conducted by the Rev. J. A. McCormick who ministered to him before he was hanged.

tution superintendents.

Only two minor appropriations for capital outlays had been approved by the ways and means committee at the time of adjournment Friday.

One of these appropriations was in the amount of \$45,000 for converting the old state training school for boys into a branch penitentiary. The other was for \$23,000 for the purpose of erecting a two-story garage at the main prison. It was argued that these improvements would relieve the crowded conditions at the penitentiary, and delay the erection of another cell block for at least two years.

Approximately 75 of the prisoners now confined in the main prison, will be transferred to the branch plant, while 100 prisoners will be housed in the upper story of the garage.

It is not likely that the ways and means committee will approve an appropriation of \$50,000 for an infirmary on the campus of the University of Oregon. The appropriation was asked by a committee of women, conditional upon friends of the institution contributing an additional \$50,000.
