When the Federal Reserve Bank was suggested, high finance protested, saying it would bring ruin. Now these financiers tell you the Federal Reserve has saved and will save the country from panic.

This, the richest country in the world, is on a nutty bank, business men paying 7 per cent for money and more, stock investors paying up to 12 per cent. In France, "impovertished by the war," business borrows all it needs at 4 per cent and less.

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The Inaugural Pageant FROM WASHINGTON TO HOOVER

George (Associated Press Feature Writer) WASHINGTON—(P) Through a country where steel trains thunder and airplanes and motor cars today roar a tocsin of twentieth century speed, George Washington 140 years ago made a seven-day journey over mud roads from Mount Vernon to New York City to become the first president of the United States.

It was the wish of General Washington, leaving the beloved seclusion of his estate on the Potomac, to avoid all semblance of parade, but the adulation of the people of the young republic made that impossible.

Groups of citizens and detachments of militia escorted him the entire distance, and he rode under triumphal arches into Philadelphia and other cities. The ladies of the period showered him with flowers and rendered, with colonial modesty, sonatas to the commander-in-chief of the continental army.

April 30, 1789, Washington, the federalist and Virginia gentleman, took the oath of office on the gallery of the Federal Hall in the presence of an "immense concourse of citizens." The people were assembled in Broad street on Manhattan island, once the ball-walk of the fiery Dutch governor, Peter Stuyvesant, and now the financial center of the world.

The New York Daily Advertiser in its issue of May 1, 1789, gives this contemporary account of the inaugural ceremonies. "At 9 a. m. the clergy of different denominations assembled their respective places of worship and offered up prayers for the safety of the president."

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Your Income Tax

No. 1. Thousands of inquiries have reached the bureau of internal revenue relative to changes in tax legislation. The purpose of the bureau is to answer these questions in a series of newspaper statements, based on the revenue act of 1928, approved May 29, 1928.

The rate of income tax and surtax applicable to individual income, and the personal exemption of individuals and credits for dependents, remain unchanged. The normal tax rate is 1 1/2 per cent on the first \$4,000 in excess of personal exemption, credits for dependents, etc., 3 per cent on the next \$4,000, and 5 per cent on the balance. The surtax rates apply to net incomes in excess of \$10,000. The maximum rate is 20 per cent, which applies to net income in excess of \$100,000.

The rate of tax on the income of corporations is reduced from 15 per cent to 12 per cent. The same rate applies to the income of insurance companies, reduction with respect to this class of taxpayers being from 12 1/2 per cent to 12 per cent. The credit allowed a domestic corporation, the net income of which is \$25,000 or less, is increased from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

DR. WILLIAM BYRD PASSES IN SALEM. SALEM, Ore., Feb. 4.—(P) Dr. William H. Byrd, dean of the medical fraternity in Marion county, died at his home here early today following a recurrence of a serious illness of about a year ago. Dr. Byrd was born in Marion county 75 years ago. His mother died here only a year ago at the age of 92. Dr. Byrd is survived by three children, Miss Winnifred M. Byrd, nationally known pianist, Clarence Byrd of Salem and Dr. Donald Byrd, a Portland dentist. He also leaves four brothers and two sisters, J. C. and Edgar E. Byrd of Spokane, La. A. and Roy D. Byrd of Salem, and Mrs. Virginia Byrd of Portland and Mrs. L. H. McManis of Salem.

OHIO TREASURER FACES SENTENCE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 4.—(P) State Treasurer Bert B. Buckley today faced possible impeachment action through two channels following his conviction in federal court of attempted bribery and conspiracy to violate the prohibition law. Buckley can be impeached in the state legislature, after the senate trial on charges voted in the house. He also can be forced from office by decree of Franklin county appellate court after a hearing introduced by popular petition.

The state treasurer stands convicted on conspiracy to warn Cincinnati brewers of a general inspection, and of offering John P. Eckhart, acting assistant prohibition administrator \$200 for information of federal activity there. He faces a maximum sentence of 28 years to federal penitentiary and a fine of \$27,000.
