BILLIARD PLAYERS OPEN TOURNAMENT FOR \$10,000 PRIZE

NEW YORK, Feb. 4. — With six masters of the cue in the field, the world's championship 15.2 billiard tournament opens at the Hotel Elton tonight.

To Edward Hornamann, the present titleholder, falls the honor of opening the tournament. The challenger, Belgian, meets Kiney Matsuyama, little Japanese holder of the world's junior championship, in the first of the 15 400-point matches, at 8:30 tonight. Tomorrow afternoon Welker Cochran, one of two American hopes, will play Eric Haglund, German champion.

In the evening, Jack Schiefer, son of the old wizard, will meet Felix Grange of France. Play will continue every afternoon and evening except Sunday, with the windup a week from tomorrow night.

For the first time in many years Willie Hoppe, long monarch of the billiard game, will not be a contestant. He finished sixth in a field of seven in the last tournament at Washington in 1927, and now devotes himself almost exclusively to three-cushion billiards.

With a half dozen masters of the game in the field, there can be no outstanding favorite. Experts, however, are disposed to eliminate Matsuyama and Grange from the consideration. The other four are rated with about equal chances of capturing the \$10,000 crown which will carry with it a cash award of approximately \$10,000. The runner-up will receive about \$5,000.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4. — Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth college star, defends his heavyweight wrestling championship in a finish match with Howard Cantonwine, of Iowa, in Madison Square Garden tonight. It will be Sonnenberg's fourth title since he won the title recently in Boston from Ed (Strongarm) Lewis. Since then he has beaten Charlie Hansen in Kansas City, Frank Jorgensen in St. Louis, and John Smith in Philadelphia.

Mandell Fights Tonight.

PEORIA, Ill., Feb. 4. — Sammy Mandell, world's light-weight champion, will time up his right cross and left hook again tonight when he clashes with Don Davis of Chicago in a 10-round bout. They will meet at 140 pounds and Mandell's title will not be threatened, even though a decision will be announced.

The first step of the hold is a body scissors and further details will be demonstrated to Alley in person tonight.

Tex Porter and Tommy Ryan are also in the pink of condition for their handiwork semi-windup. The card will begin at 8:30.

SALEM HOOPSTERS TO INVADE LOCAL FLOOR ON FRIDAY

The Salem high school basketball team, for many years a steady contender for the city high school championship, will invade the local floor on Friday and Saturday for two games. The Whamette Valley team will play in Ashland Thursday evening.

The locals scored a 23-to-10 victory over the visitors a week ago, in the Salem team is expected to put up a sturdy struggle as they are notorious as better performers away from their own court than upon it. COOPERATIVE EXCHANGE TO SHIP CAR TURKEYS

About a half a carload of turkeys have been received for the Farmers' Co-operative Exchange shipment to Savage and Co., New York City. The road will close next week, and it is thought that turkey farmers will bring in their fowls by that time.

Manager J. D. Parker of the Farmers' Co-operative Exchange said this afternoon to confer with turkey growers there, about making up a carload shipment, if local growers are unable to complete the car.

A survey of the local situation shows there are not many turkeys left. Many are No. 1 turkeys, underweight, and the farmers are difficult about selling them, as No. 2's and at a lower price, when they are fine, fat birds.

LORETTA NEITZEL SETS NEW MARKS FOR SKATE SPORT

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 4. — Miss Loretta Neitzel of Detroit today holds three new world's skating records and the women's amateur senior outdoor speed skating championship of America.

Miss Neitzel set new marks in the 440-yard and one-mile events in competition, and then in a race against time, established a record for one-sixth of a mile.

Five seconds off the old time in the 440 when Miss Neitzel covered the distance in 29.24 seconds. The former mark was held by Mrs. Lella Potter of Toronto. The Detroit woman's flash completed the mile event in 2:18.45, which was 53.5 seconds faster than the record time of Mrs. Potter.

In the race against time, Miss Neitzel beat her own figure of 35 seconds for one-sixth of a mile, making it in 28.25 seconds.

Miss Neitzel so far outdistanced the field of skaters that she had little difficulty in amassing 130 points for the championship. Marie Becker of Chicago, finished second with 50 points and Miss Mildred Burke, Minneapolis, was third with 36.

Allen Potts of Brooklyn, N. Y., won the international men's senior outdoor title, while the intermediate honors went to Douglas Ellison of Chicago.

TOMMY LOUGHRAN AND OPPONENT IN PINK FOR BATTLE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4. — Tommy Loughran, light-heavyweight champion, and Armand Emmanuel, youthful San Francisco lawyer-lover, rested on their guns today, their training ended for the 10-round battle at the Olympic auditorium here tomorrow night, with each in the proverbial "pink" of condition.

Loughran entered his second day of rest, having topped off his conditioning last Saturday, while Emmanuel completed his training yesterday. Rather than chance going stale by doing nothing, Emmanuel programmed some leg exercises for today. Loughran, however, had no work on his day's slate.

Emmanuel finished up his training with a fairly stiff workout yesterday. He boxed at top speed for three rounds with Bert Collins, thirty Whitier, Cal., Mexican middleweight, in addition to other routine exercises. The form displayed by the San Francisco local in his gymnasium workouts, has done much to swing many into his following. Odds still remained in favor of the champion, however, being quoted at 10 to 8 and 10 to 5 1/2.

NEW CHAMBER HEAD OF ASHLAND MEETS MEDFORD KIWANIS

It is not the natural resources, nor the geographical advantages, that make the cities. This was a statement made in the interesting talk given before the Kiwanis club this noon by George H. Mosier, new secretary of the Ashland chamber of commerce.

Mr. Mosier, formerly connected with state chamber of commerce work in the state of Indiana, was sold on Oregon four years ago, he said by Irving Minna, who then the sheer force of his oratory, became the honored speaker at a chamber of commerce convention attended by 23 state chambers in Pittsburgh at that time.

A forceful speaker himself, Mr. Mosier proved in his talk today that he has a vital and comprehensive grasp on the constructive problems of this state, in spite of the fact that he has been here only 10 days, when he arrived to take over his new post.

Carrying out the theme of his speech, that it was people, not necessarily geographical advantages, that made cities, Mr. Mosier cited the examples of Battle Creek, Michigan, which became famous as a breakfast food city, when any other city could have developed the same product just as well; and Grand Rapids, which is noted as a furniture center, in spite of the fact that this city imports its lumber from Mississippi and Louisiana, carrying it thru Chicago, and St. Louis, two of its rivals in the same industry.

He contrasted Oregon, and its splendid chamber of commerce programs and ready cooperation, with some of the middle western towns which, in spite of their wealthy natural resources have gone backward in population and development, simply because they have been ruled by selfish men, who thwarted opportunities for their communities thru the fear of losing something for themselves.
