An increase in Oregon's death rate from 1123 for each 100,000 population in 1926 to 1148 for each 100,000 in 1927 is reported by the department of commerce. The total number of deaths in the state was 5857 in 1926 and 6229 in 1927. The principal increases in rate in 1927 were from diseases of the heart, from 193 to 218 for each 100,000, and influenza, from 25 to 28. Decreases were reported in the rates of death from diarrhoea, enteritis, pneumonia, whooping cough and diphtheria.

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DR. W. T. LOCKE OF MISSION SERVICE TALKS TO ROTARY

The old argument that "Asiatics have no morale is ridiculous. We have proof that leaders in China know how to create a morale," said Dr. W. T. Locke, Presbyterian missionary, who spent several years in China, the principal speaker at the Rotary club luncheon at Hotel Medford this noon.

While the Americans were wringing their brows over the practicability of establishing an air mail service, Chang Tao Lin, in China, was sending his mail across the wilds of Manchuria. If the official in charge of his own particular mail service reached his post on time Chang rewarded him with a bonus. If he was late, he lost his head. That's the way to create morale. You cannot do it by singing or praying either.

Dr. Locke said that the way to keep Asia and Europe from flooding the markets with their products and crippling our industries is to raise the standards of their living. He will speak tonight at the Presbyterian church.
