

PLANT IMPROVED FATHER AND SON TO MEET MODERN BOY SCOUT MEET SPRAYING NEEDS SET FOR FRIDAY

The new Bear Creek lime-sulphur plant is rapidly nearing completion and is practically ready for the 1929 spraying season, according to David Rosenberg of the Bear Creek orchards yesterday afternoon.

The demands of the average grower, and especially growers using underground stationary spray plants, said Mr. Rosenberg, "are for a product of absolute clarity in which no particles of sediment will go through the spray mechanism. It is a matter of fact that stationary plants are increasing and therefore it became necessary to reconstruct our plant to meet these conditions."

James A. Lane, one of the leading authorities on the Pacific coast in lime-sulphur plant construction, is responsible for the new machinery and arrangement of our plant. Mr. Lane has supervised the construction of the large Rex plants in the north and is recognized as being an authority on this matter. We have installed about 5000 worth of new machinery, including a specially constructed filter press capable of straining out every particle of foreign matter. New arrangements have been worked out for cleaning the barrels to eliminate all possible crystallization developing on the inside.

"Our product," continued Mr. Rosenberg, "this year will be the standard 22 degree test produced by standard manufacturers on the coast and we will have a capacity of 125 barrels a day, ample for every requirement of this valley for several years to come."

"We feel," he concluded, "that we can well adopt a popularly known automobile slogan. When better line and sulphur is made, we will make them."

SURVEY STARTED FOR LAKE CREEK MARKET ROADBED POULTRY HANDLING ARRANGEMENT FOR COMPANY FORMED FARM CO-OP HERE FOR GAS SERVICE

The county engineer's office this morning began the survey on the west end of the Lake Creek market road. This is the major road project in this county this year. It is not expected that heavy construction will start late in March. The survey of the proposed Midway road will meet Thursday morning and go over the proposed route, which extends in a general direction from the Dr. C. T. Sweeney property on the Pacific highway to the Four Corners on the Center Lake highway. The first reading of the petition for the road will be held by the county Wednesday, February 7.

Proponents of the road set forth that it will shorten the distance for the hauling of dairy and orchard products to this city. Opponents of the project claim that its benefits will not offset the damage caused by a right of way through orchards and farm land. The county engineer has a small force of workers engaged on rock work near McLeek in the present district. The road is financed by a special road levy, voted by the district. Dirt work on the road will not be undertaken until next month.

The county maintenance force has completed the resurfacing of Deak Lane road, and has banked and widened the curves on this heavily used thoroughfare.

A working agreement between the Farm Co-operative Exchange and the Pacific Poultry Exchange is being consummated today. It is expected that the benefits of association with the Pacific Co-operative Exchange, pending the establishment of a branch in this city.

The agreement provides that the Pacific Co-operative Exchange will take all the surplus of the local growers on the same terms as granted to their own members. Don Ganes, head of the Poultry department of the Farm Co-operative Exchange is in Portland today completing the deal which was engineered by the local Poultry association and Manager City D. Parker. The agreement is effective at once.

The agreement was made possible by reason of the recent established rate of the Southern Pacific railway, which profits poultry shipments in transit and in less than carload lots.

The Pacific Co-operative plans on the establishment of a branch in this city as soon as there are 100,000 hens in this territory. It is now estimated there are less than 50,000 in the area between Grants Pass and Ashland.

A new concern known as the Medford Rockgas company has been organized in this city by H. Williams, William Hammett and Peoples Electric store for the marketing of Rockgas natural gas in southern Oregon. This firm, with Mr. Williams as sales manager, have secured the Rockgas franchise for Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties and branch offices will be established in the near future in Klamath Falls and Grants Pass. Hammett's Plumbing Shop and Peoples Electric store will be the Medford dealers.

The Medford Rockgas company will center their efforts in supplying natural gas service to out-of-town homes which do not have connections with gas mains, and with summer homes, auto camps and resorts. Then the installation of inexpensive Rockgas equipment for cooking and heating may be enjoyed in the most remote homes.

"Rockgas," according to H. H. Williams, is principally propane and butane, two of the heavier gases which comprise a part of the mixture of paraffin gases known as natural gas. Two of the gases in natural gas are selected which can be liquefied and this liquid is placed under pressure in containers. The consumers of Rockgas have the benefits of a gas which is shipped as a liquid in tanks. Each part of liquid turns to 200 parts of 5000 B. T. U. gas.

Regular gas appliances may be used by those employing Rockgas for heat and cooking, says Mr. Williams. Slight alterations are made, however, to assure maximum efficiency. The new gas, according to the officers of the Medford Rockgas company, is safe to use, containing no carbon

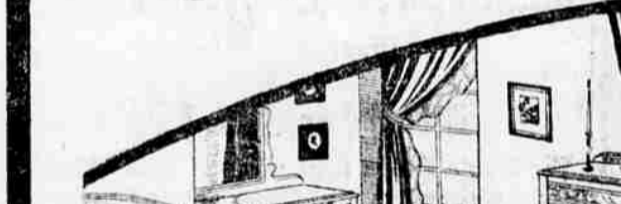
