## LOUGHRAN WINS TORRID BATTLE WITH EMANUEL

### Philadelphian Ends Ten-Round Bout in Whirlwind Attack — Fans Dispute Decision — Left Hook Upset Champ in Seventh.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Twice Tommy Loughran, the good-looking light heavyweight champion from Philadelphia, has had his right hand raised in token of victory over Armand Emanuel, and twice the youthful boxing barometer of San Francisco has looked good in defeat.

On the first occasion, in New York last June, Loughran took the decision, but over the protests of many who thought Emanuel had outpointed the champion. Last night, in the Olympic auditorium

here, Referee Abe Roth of San Francisco rendered a verdict in favor of Loughran at the end of 10 gruelling rounds, but more than half of the 19,325 fans apparently saw it the other way—to judge from the reception given it.

It was Loughran's greater experience that counted in the long run in the tussle, fought at a gallant which only men with the speed and skill that Emanuel and Loughran possess can stand. The majority of the ringers thought Loughran had the fight, giving the champion five or six of the sessions and calling the remainder either Emanuel's or even.

Upset in the seventh by a hard left hook on the point of the jaw, and on the short end in the eighth, Loughran started a furious finish in the remaining two rounds that could not be denied. He had almost a two to one advantage over the Bay City boxer in the last two rounds.

Chasing a round that to all appearances was his, Emanuel hooked a left to Loughran's jaw in the seventh that sent the champion to the mat. Loughran was up without a count, however, and in the

most of a furious mixup at the bell. The Emanuel left, missing fire through most of the early sessions, was in constant action in the eighth, landing to Loughran's head and body with sufficient regularity to give him the round. Loughran's pace in the ninth was terrific and he gained a two to one margin with a vicious attack of left and right hands to head and body. He carried the same pace into the tenth, outscoring the westerner at every turn. Loughran jabbed and cut at Emanuel with his great left hand through the first two rounds and battered the San Franciscan's body with rights, to take both sessions. The champion drew blood from Emanuel's nose in the third, but it stung the westerner into action and he tore into Loughran, catching him with a hard right to the jaw and beating him to the punch in a furious exchange towards the end of the round, for an edge. The fourth was even and the fifth and sixth were Loughran's by virtue of the champion's aggressiveness and harder punching.

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## U. S. CUEMEN AND JAP ARE TIED IN BILLIARDS MATCH

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The first complete turn of the wheel in the round robin tournament for the world's 18.2 ballline billiard championship today found two Americans and a Japanese tied for the lead.

Taking European opponents over the hurdles with some difficulty in yesterday's matches, Welker Cochran of Hollywood and young Jake Schaefer of Chicago forced their way into a triple deadlock with Kinsey Matsuyama for the pacesetter position. Each has won one match and lost none. Down in the cellar are the three European stars—Edouard Hocmans of Belgium, the defending champion; Felix Grange of France, and Eric Hagenbacher of Germany.

## SHARKEY STARTS STRENUOUS GRIND FOR STRIB MATCH

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey today was prepared for a strenuous session with his sparring partners, while Young Stribling, the Boston sailor's adversary in the projected battle of Flamingo park here February 27, coasted about for some way to "get the feel of the breeze" in his face. Strib will not "get the feel of the breeze" by peering over the cockpit of his airplane, for he was grounded Monday by Promoter Jack Dempsey's injunction. The Boston boy went through a hard session yesterday for the camera men, and will appear in his ring again tomorrow. Friday he will go to Tampa with Jack Dempsey to witness a boxing match. Sharkey probably will referee one of the matches.

While Stribling held to his nightly program of two and one-half miles road work, his father-manager conferred with Johnny Brodey, Sharkey's pilot, over a referee. So selection is expected until shortly before hostilities. It was announced last night by W. P. Carey, vice-president and treasurer of the Madison Square Garden corporation, that no radio broadcast of the fight was contemplated.

## Miller Turns Pro



LOS ANGELES (AP)—The small name that his newspaper corner yielded proving insufficient, Hymie Miller, 18-year-old holder of the national amateur flyweight championship, will don the more adequately remunerative gloves of the professional boxer to help provide a livelihood for his mother and seven brothers and sisters.

With the fists that made a national conquest and earned a berth on the United States Olympic boxing team, Miller hopes to keep his family out of want.

## OREGON QUINT HANDS MONTANA BAD BEATING

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 6.—(AP)—By the one-sided score of 45 to 21, Oregon's basketball quintet reversed the tables on Montana here last night. For the first few minutes of play the teams seemed evenly matched. The count was

## PORTLAND BOXER DIES FROM BLOW IN SEATTLE RING

SEATTLE, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The blow which sent Eddie Cartwright, 27-year-old negro welterweight of Portland, to the canvas and his death here last night, came while a 16-round boxing bill which would legalize professional fighting in Washington was awaiting consideration of the state legislature.

The blow itself did not cause the death of the veteran, an autopsy showed. It was the last of a battery of punches to the jaw from the gloves of Cecil Goybel, 21, Seattle. A hemorrhage, resulting from the rupture of arteries at the base of the brain when Cartwright's head struck the canvas, caused his death, Coroner William J. Jones reported. The examination also revealed a diseased heart, which consulting physicians said might have caused his death from any form of overexertion.

MOSCOW, Ida., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Washington State's Cougars gave Idaho little opposition here last night in their basketball game, the local team winning by 66 to 21.
