Funeral services were to be held this afternoon for Alvin, 5, and Jean, 2, children of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Fields, who met death as a result of fire which destroyed the Fields home at Grants Pass, Monday night between Ashland and Klamath Falls, Tuesday afternoon. Alvin was burned to death at the afternoon of the fire and Jean died yesterday as the result of burns while a patient at the Ashland Community hospital.

Both bodies will be interred in the same casket at the Granite Hill cemetery at Grants Pass. The frame dwelling of the Fields family burst into flames Tuesday afternoon at 4:15, as the result of a gasoline explosion. A third member of the family, a son eight years old, is also in the hospital suffering from serious burns, but will recover, according to reports from Ashland today. The mother was said to be in a bad condition as the result of grief and a few minor burns.

Efforts were being made in Ashland this forenoon to raise a relief fund for the stricken family and was reported to be indicative of success.
