YOUNG JAP HAS LEAD POSITION IN CUE BATTLE

Heads Six Contestants at Opening of Second Lap in Balkline Tourney—Jake Schafer Next in Line—Grange in Cellar.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Starting the second lap of the round robin tournament, Kiyoshi Matsuyama, Japanese, stood alone today at the head of the six contestants for the world's 18.2 balkline billiards championship. Matsuyama is the only one who has played two matches and won both. Behind him in the standing is Young Jake Schafer of Chicago, who was victorious in his only match.

The defending champion, Edouard Horemans of Belgium, and Welker Cochran, young Californian, are tied for third place with one victory and one defeat as the result of their meeting last night. Eric Hagenlacher, German entry, has lost his only match, while Felix Grange of France occupies the cellar position with two defeats.

The brilliant young Japanese, who opened the tournament Monday with a fine victory over Horemans, continued his good work in the afternoon match yesterday to overwhelm Grange by a 400 to 218 count. The match was the longest of the tournament to date, going 23 innings, as both contestants had 41 fittings controlling the balls at the start.

Horemans Comes Back.
Horemans came back from his defeat by Matsuyama last night to run off 400 points in only 11 innings to against Cochran, winning 400 to 290. The highest run made so far in the event aided materially in the Belgian's victory. Trailing 191 to 25 in the fifth inning as a result of Cochran's fine run of 153, Horemans gave his first exhibition of the game that won him the title a year ago, nursing the balls along the ends of the table and gathering them with spectacular shots to equal his opponent's total in one inning. Other runs of 77, 42, 79 brought the match to its quick end.

The Bel. an's victory brought him the highest average of the tournament as well as the high run. He's marks is 25 17-27 for the two matches. Matsuyama, leader in the first round, fell off to a 20 20-29 average. Horemans averaged 26 4-11 for yesterday's match. Horemans will play his third match this afternoon against Grange, while Schafer and Hagenlacher complete the second round in the evening.

BLAZING the SPORTS TRAIL

Times has changed in the boxing racket. Like everything else, it seems to be quite an argument whether it has been for better or worse, so far as the ancient game of cuffing chins is concerned. Certainly the competitive features of 1928 were far removed in class from the epic campaign of 1923, when Dempsey and Firpo fought to a smashing climax a campaign that saw virtually every title staked at one time or another with a scattering few exceptions.

Perhaps as conspicuous a change as any in the fistie business over that period affected the man who pulled the strings. Death took Tex Rickard from the rich and harmoniously blended surroundings in modern offices where only five years ago he had governed the racket from an untidy little office high in the famous tower of the old Madison Square Garden.

Heavy gilt-framed pictures of his friends and business associates embellish the walls of the sanctum Rickard occupied. Thick rugs carpet the floors and the furniture is the sort you will find in the board room of any big corporation. Secretaries and assistants barred the way to wholesale intrusion, although newspapermen still had about as much access as they had when Rickard was battling his way up.

Rickard and his inseparable cigar was surrounded in the Old Garden, leaning Tony, and getting every kind of a blow in return. Cannoneri took the hardest of Samnor's blows, and sent harder ones back. Occasionally Samnor would strike out with a left, but it was only a gesture, for the steam was gone. When the seventh came it was nothing but courage that lifted his gloves in defense. Body blows paid the way for the finish, and a right cross to the chin ended the contest.

SANGOR ABANDONS RING LIFE AFTER BEING FLATTENED

CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—(AP)—At the age of 25 Joey Sangor has decided to quit the feature-wrecking quest of a boxing championship. His mother, he told the radio audience last night after he was able to get off the canvas where Tony Cannoneri had knocked him in the seventh round, was anxious for him to abandon the ring, and furthermore, he was dissatisfied himself with his 1928 showing. Sangor's final ring appearance—if it proves to have been his final one—was before the largest crowd ever packed within the walls of the Coliseum. It was a brave fight, though he lost, for he took punishment by the fists for seven weary rounds, gamely fighting on through his face and body were sore from the Cannoneri cannonade.

Really he was knocked out twice, but the bell gave him time to pull himself together after he had been sprawled in the waning seconds of the second round. He was completely out in that round as he was in the final one, but the bell rang as the timekeeper tolled a seven count.
