### SUFFICIENT SNOW FURNISH ASHLAND ALL WATER NEEDS

ASHLAND, Ore., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—The new city reservoir built the past summer in Ashland Creek canyon may not have to be filled this winter. Earl Hosler, superintendent of the city water department, states that with the present snowfall of nearly seven feet in the mountains south of town it is quite probable that the normal flow of the creek will be sufficient to supply the needs of the city in 1929.

The present supply of snow is more than at this time last year so the summer flow is expected to be above the average. In case it is found unnecessary to use the reservoir the coming season an opportunity will be given to put the dam in better shape than it has to hold a full supply of water.

According to an announcement made by Harold S. Ains, manager of the local telephone office, the operators hereafter will give the time of day to anyone asking for it over a customer's telephone. Fill with marmaladows or nuts and dates.

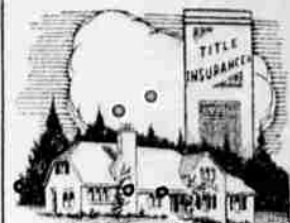
To serve as home for our many organizations has been a dream of the Greater Medford club for years and for a long period, the club has been working and saving for such a building.

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### CONCESSION REVENUE AT AIRPORT SEEN AS AID IN SINKING FUND

The revenue from concessions already applying for leases on the proposed new \$129,000 airport, will not only take care of the interest after the first five years of operation, but will provide a sinking fund which can be used to pay off the bond issue itself, according to Seelye Hall, chairman of the airport committee, who with W. A. Gates, another member, spoke before the Lions club Wednesday.

The leases already applied for amount to over \$190, which will be paid into the airport fund the first year of its operation. This

sum will be received from shop leases, gas and oil concessions, restaurants, pilots' quarters, hangar and outside storages and other sources.

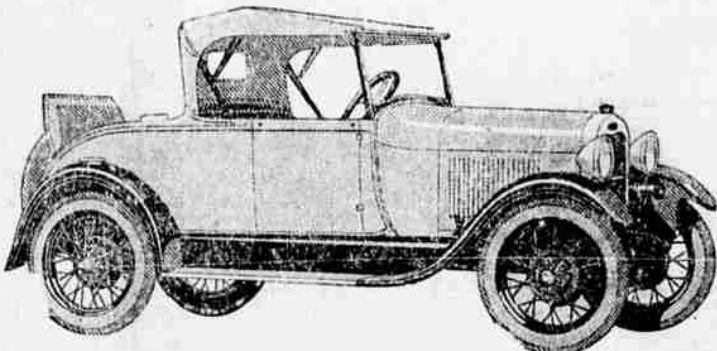
It is anticipated, according to members of the committee, that this revenue will be increased many times during the next 10 years, with the development of aviation and the further use of planes as a medium of travel and transportation.

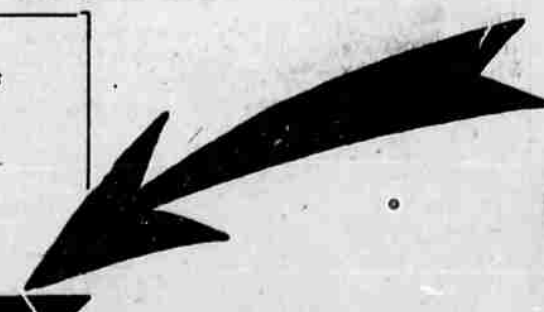

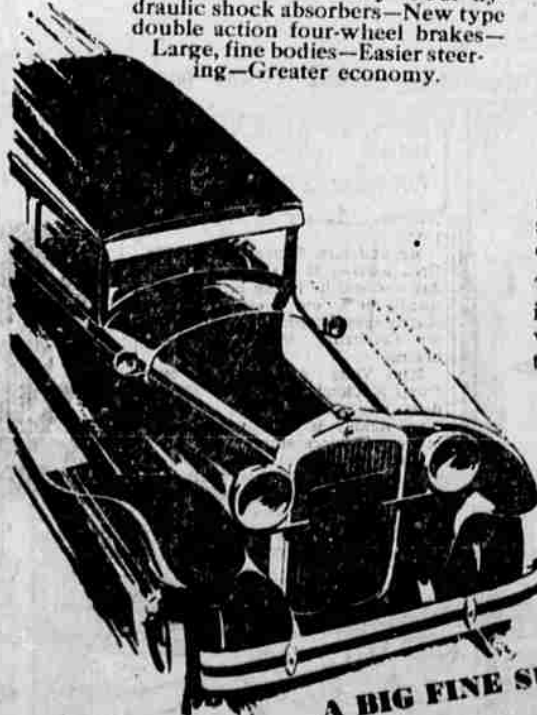
