# ABUNDANT WATER OVER 4000 ACRES FOR EAGLE POINT

EAGLE POINT, Ore., Feb. 8.—(Special.) The Eagle Point Irrigation district is nearly through cleaning the lateral system, leaving only the main canal to be cleaned and it is in very good shape due to the fact that there has not been any long heavy rains.

The district is working a crew of fifteen men and will start on the main canal in about two weeks.

R. T. Seaman, manager of the district, says they always have an abundance of water and will deliver water to about 4,000 acres for 1929 in place of 3,200 last year and 2,600 the year before, showing a steady increase in the land being farmed. It is plain to be seen that only water can produce the large crops that the farmers with irrigated land produce.
