## DEMPSEY FIGURES BOOK PROFIT FOR STRIBLING FIGHT

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 8.—(AP) Jack Dempsey and the Madison Square Garden corporation were some \$30,000 to the good on the Sharkey-Stribling fight today, if estimates of the cost of the February 27 slug-fest prove correct.

Dempsey has announced ticket sales for the Flamingo Park match already have reached \$189,000, which exceeds by \$30,000 the estimated cost of the spectacle.

Meanwhile the principals have added ring workouts to their golf course training for the projected affair. The Boston sailor went through a stiff workout yesterday with the light and heavy bags, and indicated he would get down to "real hard work" Monday on his return from Tampa, where he will watch a boxing match tonight.

Stribling held to his nightly road work, but expects also to get in several strenuous workouts at his Hardie's Casino training camp before his departure for the Everglades Tuesday on a fishing expedition.

Dempsey took occasion last night to deny again that he has signed a contract to fight in September. While admitting Sharkey has signed for a Madison Square Garden battle if he wins from Stribling, and that the prize of \$50,000 also has been agreed to a fight, he himself has signed no contract, he said.

## OHIO HEAVY HONORS ONE GAME LEAD FOR HORSESHOE HONORS

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 8.—(AP) As play entered semifinals today, Blair Nunamaker of Cleveland held a one-game lead over Bert Duryee in the battle for the world's horseshoe pitching championship.

The tournament probably will end tomorrow. Duryee held second with eight victories and one defeat, while Nunamaker won his ninth victory against one loss. C. C. Davis of Columbus, Ohio, defending champion, lost two games in yesterday's play.

Mrs. Mayme Francisco of Columbus, Ohio won the "women's world championship" by defeating Mrs. George Brouillette of Minneapolis, 50 to 42.

## OREGON HOOP COACH WILL LEARN TO FLY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON Eugene, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Chuck Jost, assistant basketball coach of the University of Oregon, will resign after the Washington game here February 22, to go to March Field, Riverside, Cal., where he has been appointed a flying cadet in the government school. It is a one-year enlistment.

Jost is a former Oregon basketball star and was a member of the 1924 northern conference championship team. He played at Oregon in 1924, 1925 and 1926, and was all-northwest guard in 1926.

## LEADING GOLFERS TEE OFF IN PLAY PENSACOLA TODAY

PENSACOLA, Fla., Feb. 8.—(AP) A \$3500 prize list attracted more than 125 leading golfers of the country for the initial play today in the Greater Pensacola open tournament. The 72-hole medal competition is being played over the Pensacola Country club course.

In a practice round yesterday, Craig Wood, New York pro, smashed the local course record with a 65, six strokes below par. The previous course record was 69.

With the exception of Walter Hagen and Johnny Farrell, most of the best known golfers of the country were entered. Hagen declared he would not enter the early Florida tournaments this year and Farrell wired yesterday from St. Augustine that he was indisposed.

## JAPANESE HOLDS LEAD IN TOURNNEY, BELGIAN SECOND

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Kin-ryu Matsuyama stood alone today as the only unbeaten contestant in the world's championship 15.2 ball-line billiards tournament. But the Japanese came at least a part of his exalted position to some exceedingly brilliant billiards by Eric Hagenlacher, the phlegmatic German.

Uncorking a run of 207, highest of the tournament, last night, Hagenlacher gave Young Jake Schaefer his first defeat and achieved, for himself, his first victory.

With seven of the 15 matches down on the books, Matsuyama now leads the procession with two victories and no defeats. The runner-up is the defending champion, Edouard Horemans, of Belgium, with two wins and a single loss to the Japanese, bunched behind the leaders are Schaefer, Hagenlacher and Welker Cochran, of Hollywood, each with an even break in two starts. Felix Grange, of France, brings up the rear with three set-backs in a row.

The Hagenlacher-Schaefer duel last night was the closest and most exciting of the tournament.

Young Jake was in form from the start and quickly ran up a lead, to 100 to 93 at the end of the 4th inning. Here Hagenlacher got the balls together and nursed them along until he had counted 207. A long two-cushion effort failed on his 28th carom. After that the match was a long drawn out affair, cautiously played by both contestants. Hagenlacher finally ran out in the 17th inning with an unfinished run of five.

Today Hagenlacher met Matsuyama in the afternoon and Cochran plays Grange in the evening.

## KARASICK ANXIOUS TO WRESTLE HERE

Regretting the action taken against him in barring him from Medford for non-appearance at a wrestling match here last year, Al Karasick, Portland wrestler, when he was in Medford a short time ago, preparatory to wrestling in Grants Pass, voiced his willingness to wrestle again in this city with the understanding that he would put up a cash forfeit for his appearance.

Karasick is sorry he is not wanted by the boxing commission to take part in Medford shows, but is anxious to demonstrate his good will by posting a \$500 cash forfeit with any local promoter with the commission. He would either wrestle on a basis of percentage or with a cash guarantee and meet any wrestler the commission chooses to match against him.

"I make my home in Oregon and I'm proud of my state," said Karasick, "and personally I feel the people of Medford are friendly to me if engaged in my roadshow. I still maintain that I was to have received a cash guarantee on my last visit here, but then that may have been a misunderstanding between myself and Sailor Jack Wood. If the people of Medford want me to wrestle, I will certainly do my best against any wrestler they choose to put up against me."

The Russian wrestler, formerly a dancing instructor of ballet in Moscow, is regarded as one of the best wrestlers of his class on the Pacific coast, and is believed to be an equal of Ted Thye, world's light-heavyweight champion. He appeared in Medford last spring in a match with Bill Montana and drew one of the largest crowds of the year. He threw Montana and displayed remarkable strength and good wrestling skill, featuring the reverse headlock with which he has won the majority of his matches.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—(AP)—"Dynamite Gus" Sonnenberg, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, will attempt to win the sanction of the Illinois state athletic commission to use his "Flying Tackle" hold tonight.

Sonnenberg will meet Frank Forbes of New York in an exhibition match while commission members watch his hold. If it wins approval, he may risk his title in Chicago soon.

## BIG BILL AND HUNTER PLAN SOUTHERN TRIP TO POINT FOR EUROPE

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Big Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter, mainstays of several Davis cup teams, will stage an international jaunt of their own this year instead of helping the American team through the preliminary competition in the American zone. Believing that Tilden will be reinstated by the executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis association at its meeting in Boston this evening, they have laid plans for a southern trip, starting this month, to prepare them for an invasion of European courts in May.

They will sail for Europe on May 8, Hunter said yesterday, and play in the French championships at Paris, May 29, and the British championships at Wimbledon, June 24, as well as several less important events. This program would make it impossible for them to participate in the American zone Davis cup matches. Whether they will join the team in Europe in case it reaches the interzone final is not decided.
