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BIG GOLD DREDGE MAKING PROGRESS ON FOOTS CREEK

The big gold dredge recently put into operation and located to work by the winter is now passing and within a few months it will be to the land which formerly was covered by the dredge owned by Champlin.

The old dredge used in these operations is still standing where it was last worked and can be seen from the road up the left-hand fork of the creek. This land will be dredged again and then the right-hand fork of Foots creek will be covered. It is expected that several years' work is ahead at present and it will be kept in operation at all times.

Three new crews of men are being employed clearing the land down the left-hand fork of the creek from where the dredge is working at present. The timber is being removed and cut into wood as fast as possible. Several hundred cords of wood have already been removed from the land which it is to cover.

To one who has never before witnessed any operations of this kind, the big dredge now presents a very interesting view.

The Gold Hill high school basketball team is now progressing fairly well in their interscholastic activities. A game was scheduled with Rogue River high school at Rogue River in the gymnasium on the evening of Friday, February 5th. This game was postponed by agreement and set at a later date in the season. The team is coached by Charles Orr. Mr. Orr has given the team some good workouts and deserves credit for putting it where it is now. Regular practice is held and they work hard to gain the championship when they meet the other schools of their district at the tournament which will be held during the first part of next month, probably at Medford. It was held there last year, and probably will be again.

At the last tournament Gold Hill took second place, and it is hoped that they can this year advance one point and capture first place.
