MEDFORD LOSES HECTIC TILT TO SALEM 22 TO 20

In a hectic game, featured by much roughness, Salem defeated Medford last night at the armory. There was a big crowd in attendance and from the spectator's standpoint there was plenty of action and thrills.

Callison changed his tactics and went to the man-to-man defense. On the other and Salem played a much better game than in the previous contest. With Medford's old time stonewall game they had little trouble in penetrating the home team's defense.

At no time in the game did Medford seriously threaten to take the lead except in the closing minutes. While the score was tied for a moment in the first of the third quarter, Salem promptly assumed the lead again and held it. R. Kelly made some sensational long shots for Salem and MacDonald did the same for Medford. The fans were in a delirium of excitement in the last of the 4th quarter when Medford rallied. The score was 22 to 12 when Melvin started the scoring by converting two free throws. MacDonald followed with a long basket. In a scrimmage under the basket Bowerman found the hoop in a difficult shot and set the excited crowd to wild cheering. Salem took time out to stem the scoring. There was but five seconds left when play was resumed and Garnett made a long shot from the center of the court and the ball dropped through the net as the final whistle sounded.

The game was the roughest seen on the floor this season, but only once did one of the Medford players forget himself and make an unsportsmanlike display of temper. The other players wore their customary smiles.

Samund, for Salem, played a fine game. He got his eye cut in a collision and also injured his leg, but played the game out. R. Kelly was high point man, ably assisted by every man on the team. Ecker went out on four personals.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, N. Y., Feb. 9.—(AP)—The triumphant march of Paavo Nurmi, Finland's famous runner, was abruptly checked tonight by Ray Conger, of the Illinois A. C., who outperformed the Finnish Finn in a surprisingly sensational fashion in the Rodman Wainman mile, featuring the Milwaukee track and field carnival.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Paavo Nurmi, sensational young Canadian speed king and Olympic champion swept the international sprint series, a feature of the Milwaukee track carnival tonight by galloping off with the fifty yard final after a previous triumph at 99 yards.

SCHAEFFER WINS FROM HOREMANS IN HECTIC GAME

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—(AP)—A mild excitement and tension caused by a disputed decision, argument between the players, spectators, and referee, Jake Schaeffer, former champion from Chicago, tonight defeated Edouard Horemans, of Belgium, defending titleholder, in one of the first crucial matches of the 1929 billiard championship tournament for the world championship.

The final score was 400 to 271.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Eric Hagenaether, the "hard luck hero" of the 1922 billiard tournament for the world's championship, came into his own today and set up two tourney records in whipping Felix Grange, 400 to 183. In the afternoon match, the German champion, twice beaten in preliminary matches, set up a high run mark of 264, and a high game average of forty.

BOXING BILL FOR NEXT WEDNESDAY

Medford's first boxing smelter for 1929 will be held February 13, at the armory, according to Sailor Jack Wood, who promises one of the best main event battles ever seen in Medford, featuring Charles O'Leary of Seattle against Pat Padelford of this city at 123 pounds. The six-round semi-final between Fidel Sanchez of Portland and Pinky Thornton of this city is expected to be another fast match, both boys being clever boxers. There will also be two preliminary events.

Oregon's next swimming meet will be an inter-sectional affair here Tuesday against the Northwestern University of Chicago.

NIFTY UNIFORMS NEXT MONTH FOR MESSENGER BOYS

After March 1 every messenger boy in the Postal Telegraph company's service, here as well as in other parts of the country and the world, will be garbed on duty with a nifty new standard uniform for the company's messengers. Each boy must be in full uniform while on duty, and is forbidden to wear the uniform, or any part of it, while off duty.

Only two of the handsome uniforms have been received yet, but the others will arrive before the first of next month. So striking are the uniforms that the Postal's messenger boys will be very proud to wear them.

The costume consists of navy blue serge coat and riding breeches with red cord trimmings, caps adorned with emblems, etc. The new suit uniform was designed and ordered worn after March 1, since the merger of the Postal Telegraph company with the International Telegraph and Telephone company, taking in of the West Indies and South America, among others. It is understood that last week France was included, and that more European countries will be included in the new merger.

LUMBER ORDERS OVER PRODUCTION MONTH JANUARY

SEATTLE, Wn., Feb. 10.—Orders exceeded production by 10.5 per cent and shipments were 6.4 percent less than cutting during the four weeks from January 22 to January 26, studies made by the West Coast Lumbermen's association on the reports of 136 major mills of the Douglas fir region in Washington and Oregon show. Mill stocks are 2.5 percent over those reported as of January 1 for 136 identical mills.

Production for the first four weeks of 1929 for 219 mills reporting to the association was 641,585,755 feet, or 29 per cent below the 903,928,524 capacity of these same mills.

The mills included in the reports from the 126 operations are among the largest in the Douglas fir region in Washington and Oregon show. Mill stocks are 2.5 percent over those reported as of January 1 for 136 identical mills.

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The mills included in the reports from the 126 operations are among the largest in the Douglas fir territory and manufacture approximately 50 per cent of the lumber shipped from this region.

Production, orders and shipments for 194 mills for the week ended February 2 were reported to the association as follows: Production 111,703,890 board feet, orders 148,391,799, and shipments 128,337,169. Orders were 32.84 per cent over production for the week, and shipment 14.89 per cent over cutting.

With a total production of 111,687,890 board feet for the week ended February 2, 190 identical mills whose reports are complete for the last four weeks had 750-

BILL SURE OF A VETO (Continued from Page 6)

Tightening up the state prohibition laws is proposed in three bills introduced at the present session of the legislature. Two of these bills were introduced by the senate alcoholic committee, while the third one was drafted by Senator Eddy.

Probably the most important of the three bills was Senator Eddy's providing a severe penalty for any person who is convicted of selling, or giving away, liquor to boys and girls under the age of 21 years.

Another of the three bills provides that a person convicted of driving an automobile while intoxicated or under the influence of liquor, shall be subject to a penitentiary sentence of from one to five years and a fine of from \$100 to \$400.

Still another bill would compel druggists to keep a complete record of all sales of medicine which contain more than the amount of alcohol allowed in beverages. There also has been introduced a bill providing for a strict accounting of prohibition funds. Under the provisions of this bill prohibition funds can only be withdrawn from the state treasury on a sworn statement. This bill was inspired, it was said, because of a recent investigation involving a district attorney.
