

ROAD VIEWERS TO FILE REPORT FOR COURT THURSDAY

William Grayson of this city, James Owens of Wellen and J. R. Robinson of Talent, named viewers of the proposed Midway road, planned to extend from a point near the Dr. Sweeney site on the Pacific highway to the "Four Corners," will file their report with the county court next Thursday. The county court, under the law, will hold the first reading and hearing at the regular meeting of the county court Wednesday, February 27.

OWEN-OREGON CO. OPEN OPERATIONS ON SIX DAY BASIS

The sawmill of the Owen-Oregon Lumber company started operating today on a six-day-a-week basis. Since the first of the year it has been operating on a four and five-day-a-week basis. The new order will provide full weeks work for between 100 and 125 men, with a corresponding increase in the payroll, which will be reflected in the business life of the city. It was also announced by General Manager James Owen that camp No. 4 at Butte Falls would start operations next Monday, February 18, and that the second camp would start two or three weeks later. The camp employs about 75 men. Most of the timber workers live at or near Butte Falls. The Medford logging railroad, a subsidiary of the Owen-Oregon company, which has been on a half-day basis, will resume operations within a short time. General Manager Owen expects to leave in a few days for the east to attend the annual meeting of the Owen-Oregon directors, when the annual budget for the year will be considered, along with recommendations for improvements of company property.

MEDFORD STANDS GOOD CHANCE FOR DIRIGIBLE HANGAR

Of all the proposed sites offered in Oregon for the United States dirigible base planned on the Pacific coast, Medford stands the best chance of being accepted by naval authorities, in view of ideal climatic conditions, is the opinion of Ted Baker, secretary of the Medford chamber of commerce, who returned yesterday with Seelye Hall from Portland, where they had attended a meeting of representatives from various parts of the state to discuss an Oregon site for the dirigible base. Over 100 delegates representing the chambers of commerce of all the Oregon counties were present at the meeting, which was held at the Hotel Portland. The delegation would have the base located between Eugene and Salem, and while explaining the advantages of the site, Baker, to mention the many rainy and foggy months of every year, said Mr. Baker. The eastern Oregon delegation would have the base at Bend, but failed to put forth any convincing argument why it should be located there. The fourth proposed site lies in the Columbia basin, between Portland and Astoria. The Portland Chamber of Commerce did not advance arguments for any particular section, but agreed to stand behind any one proposed site should other districts be in accord to stand behind the district meeting the approval of the naval authorities.
