COCHRAN STOPS WALKAWAY FOR JAP CUE ARTIST

Matsuyama Tied Last Night By Final Spurt of Hollywood Player—Young Jake Step Behind Leaders—Crucial Test Today.

By Herbert W. Barkow. (Associated Press Sports Writer.) NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Kindred Matsuyama's bold bid for the world's 15,200-buikling billiards crown has been checked by Walker Cochran, who calls Hollywood, Calif. his home.

Cochran, winner of the last tournament in Washington in 1927, rallied in the closing innings of his struggle with the little Japanese last night and won, 49 to 47.

The Californian victory put him in a tie with Matsuyama for the lead. Each has three victories and one defeat. A step behind is young Jake Schaefer of Chicago, perhaps the outstanding favorite for the title. Schaefer has won two matches out of three. The other three contestants, Edgard Horvans of Belgium, Eric Hagendicher of Germany and Felix Grange of France, all passed from the picture during the first week of play in the round robin tournament.

Either Matsuyama or Schaefer will be eliminated from the title hunt today.

The Japanese's reverse at Cochran's hands was a heart-breaking affair, accomplished in 19 innings of tense play. Cochran started off consistently, running up a lead of 13 to 26 in the first four innings. At this point, Matsuyama, with characteristic courage, put together runs of 31, 46 and 122 to lead, 255 to 210, at the close of the seventh inning. From then on it was an uphill battle for Cochran. Leading by 211 to 263 at the end of the 11th inning, Matsuyama strung together 57 caroms to boost his total to 263.

Although obviously off his game, Cochran, by dint of great effort, ran 102 to take the lead by two points. Safety play was the order thereafter, the Californian finally running out with an unbroken string of 25 in the 19th inning.

STAGG OPPOSED TO CHANGING GRID RULE

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Amos Alonzo Stagg, dean of American football coaches, is opposed to the proposed change in the rules making all fumbles dead at the point of recovery by the defensive team. "I have never opposed changes in the rules when I thought they added to the game," Mr. Stagg said today. "But I am opposed to the change in the fumble rule, because I cannot see that it helps the game, or will be attractive to the spectators."
