GERMANY UNABLE MEET PAYMENTS

PARIS, Feb. 13.—(AP) The Associated Press learned on good authority today that Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the German Reichsbank, told the reparations experts this morning that Germany could no longer pay at the present rate under the Dawes plan.

At this afternoon's session, he continued to present Germany's position on the problem of reparations before the "young committee."

The delegates, punctual as usual in opening the afternoon session, were just as tight-lipped as they had been after the morning session.

It was expected that most of this afternoon's conversation would be taken up with Dr. Schacht's exposition.
