PORTLAND JURIST TAUGHT A SCHOOL WHEN LAD OF 16

Judge Walter Evans of Portland, who delivered the masterful Lincoln day address at the Lincoln club banquet last night at Ashland, was born on a farm in Harrison county, Indiana, Sunday, April 17, 1859, and when four years of age his family moved to Elizabeth, a small town 29 miles from a rail road. When 15 years old he finally moved to Posey county.

When he was 16 years of age, he taught McFadden school on the edge of Wabash flats and with money he had earned he entered

Valparaiso university in 1886. After attending intermittently he graduated with the degree of bachelor in 1896. He took a scientific course, studied commerce and education, and studied law upon the year following his graduation. A short time later he went to Chattanooga, Tenn., and taught in a normal school until the Spanish American war, when he enlisted as a clerk and was assigned to the brigade quartermaster department at Chickamauga. In 1899 he married May Ball of Valparaiso and when in 1899 they received a transfer to army headquarters in Porto Rico they introduced the first perambulator to that island. The daughter, Mary Evans, was the first child of American parents born there.

In 1903 he arrived in Portland and entered the University of Oregon law school and was graduated in 1905. He was admitted to the bar the same year he left the army. In 1908 he was appointed by United States Attorney Bristol as deputy and in 1912 he was elected district attorney of Multnomah county. In 1921 he was appointed circuit judge to succeed John McCourt.

MARCUS DECISIONS PANAMA INDIAN IN TEN FAST ROUNDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Joe Marcus, Portland, won over Pedro Amador, San Blas Indian from Panama, here last night, after 10 rounds of very fast sailing. While Marcus had a wide margin on points, he was never idle for a moment for the little Indian boy never backed up on his own motion, but kept boring in on start to finish. One of Marcus' swinging rights caught the Indian on the side in the third round and dropped him on his back for the only knockdown of the fight.
