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CAVES ROAD WILL BE DISCUSSED AT MEDFORD MEETING

A number of out of town delegates will be present, including three carloads from Crescent City, Ashland, Jacksonville, Williams creek, Grants Pass, Central Point and rural sections.

The future is said to be bright for the construction of such road and every business man in Medford is urged to be present, in view of the importance of the meeting, which is expected to settle the differences held on the road between Medford and Grants Pass. The residents of the Climate City are said to be favoring the new road construction. If tomorrow night's meeting is a success, it is possible that the Rogue River valley will soon have a new route to the caves, with option to return by way of Grants Pass.
