

HIZZONER LEARNS DECISION REACHED LOCAL ELIGIBLES BY COUNTY COURT LIKE 'EM YOUNGER FOR SCHOOL DIST.

The most interesting thing about the divorce case of Mayor Pipes is that he is not only a local eligible but also a local school director. He is 47 years old and has a 14-year-old daughter, according to local school directors, interviewed by the city's chief executive yesterday.

After a careful consideration of the matter and an inventory of the records and witnesses of Mayor Pipes, the county court yesterday decided that the only way to make a satisfactory arrangement for the child was to allow her to be placed in the home of her mother, Mrs. Lillian Pipes, who lives at 1201 E. Main street.

The original petition asked that the Phoenix district be annexed to the Medford district.
