JAKE SCHAEFER CAPTURES TITLE FOR FIFTH TIME

Hollywood Cue Star Nosed Out 400 to 328 in Final of Tourney—Horemans in Third Place—Japanese Wins Fourth.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Jacob Schaefer of Chicago, still "Young Jake," despite 34 years of age and a dozen years of major competition, is the world's 182 balkline billiards champion for the fifth time in a period of just over seven years, by triumphing over Walker Cochran, Hollywood cue star, by the narrow margin of 400 to 328 in the final match of the international tournament which won his third championship and his fifth title. Twice he defeated other titleholders in matches under the now-abandoned system.

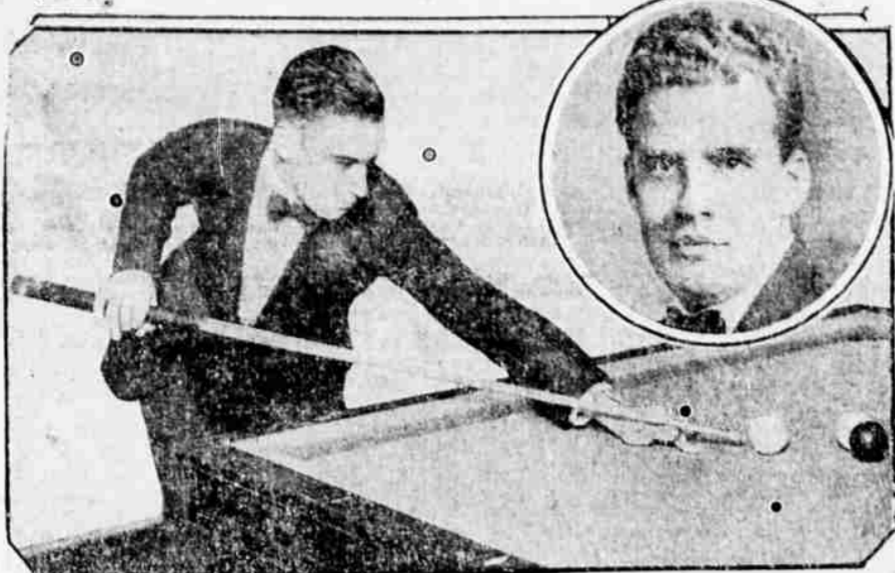
The brilliant son of the "wizard" of billiards, old Jake Schaefer, won his first tournament in 1921 and played through to victory again in 1925. Schaefer, who made his first public appearance as a billiardist in exhibitions with his father when he was only six years old, was at his brilliant best last night. Cochran was not far behind, losing his chance at a second championship through two costly fouls. Twice he was in the middle of good runs, with chances of availing himself of them, but lost out by touching the ball one time with his coat and a second with the tip of his cue, before it had stopped moving.

Billiardist of 1925 in the sixth inning played the major part in Schaefer's victory. This time he led 394 to 322, just enough to stand off the Cochran's closing rush. Cochran effected off his high runs of 52 and 51 in the eighth and ninth frames, overcoming Schaefer's best defensive tactics with daring shots. He was held to two billiards in the last two frames while Schaefer gathered up the balls for a run of 55 in the eleventh, to finish the match.

Last night's victory gave Schaefer a record of four matches won and one lost in the round robin tournament which started at the hotel club February 4th. Eric Hagenaether, who finished fifth in the standing, scored a 400 to 351 victory Thursday. With the title Schaefer took a cash prize of \$2000 and a contract for one year at a salary of \$5000, to represent a firm manufacturing billiard tables. Although defeated twice, Cochran won second money of \$1400 and a contract at \$300, by making the best average of the three who finished, with three victories and two defeats. For the five matches Cochran averaged 25 43-71 billiards an inning.

Horemans, last year's champion, took third money, \$1100 on the grand average basis, while Kinry Matsuyama, the Japanese who performed so sensationally up to his last two matches, won fourth prize of \$1000.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—(AP)—NEW YORK, land of the waving palm, and from the more prosaic confines of Madison Square Garden, comes the answer to the question that only a few short weeks ago confounded the finest minds of the stock market. They wanted to know who ever could replace Tex Rickard and what would become of the garden when the tall Texan passed away through two costly fouls. If the garden could have held them, 30,000 people would have seen Al Simon and Bud Taylor last Friday night.

The silver-haired colonel has turned the trick by replacing the showmanship that once attracted the garden with hard-headed business.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 14.—(AP)—Ted They, former holder of the world's light heavyweight wrestling championship, flashed all of his old time ring generalship and mat cunning here last night when he defeated George Kostanaros, Greek grappler from Hollywood, in one of the shortest matches seen here. There was just 19 minutes and nine seconds of actual wrestling. They took the first and third with his famous wristlock hold in falls of one minute and 10 seconds, and four minutes and 30 seconds, respectively. Kostanaros won the second fall in 13 minutes and 30 seconds with a flying mare, following a series of sawing headlocks.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 14.—Joe Stecher, Nebraska heavyweight wrestler, defeated Martinez Lopez of Mexico here last night in straight falls, using the scissors in both tumbles.

HIGH SCHOOL GIRL IN 130-HOUR COMA FROM BASKETBALL ACCIDENT

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Feb. 14.—Miss Nell Fincher, 17-year-old Delta high school basketball captain, was still in a state of coma today after more than 130 hours of unconsciousness. She fell while playing basketball last Friday, struck the back of her head on the floor and since that time has never regained consciousness.

Physicians say she has a chance to recover and yesterday declared her condition was "somewhat improved."

Those who were in the gymnasium at the time she fell said the ball was being thrown up in center, that she jumped and lost her balance.

When the coach and players found they could not rouse her, she was taken immediately to a hospital. A physician who examined her said the skull was not fractured and that she had concussion of the brain.
