

ASHLAND CHAMBER TO NOMINATE FOR BOARD DIRECTORS

ASHLAND, Ore., Feb. 14.—(Special.) Chamber of commerce members are in receipt of forms to be used in nominating twelve men from whom six are to be chosen later as members of the board of directors for the organization, following the usual custom in the elections. After the six new members are finally elected they will meet with the six members of the old board of directors and then form the organization for the work of the chamber.

The twenty standing committees formerly appointed are to be reduced to six and special committees will hereafter be appointed from time to time as occasion requires.

The Ashland Summer School of Art is assured again for this year. The advisory board met Monday afternoon and laid plans for advertising the coming session of the school which will be the sixth. It will be held in the Junior high school building commencing the first week in July and will last five weeks. John H. Fuller is chairman of the board and Mrs. V. W. Mills is secretary.

Six thousand catalogues will be distributed, principally along the coast and in the second tier of states east. Two scholarships given by the Ashland and two by the Ashland Elks lodge will be offered. Each is for \$50; one will go to some member of the Ashland high school, one to a Southern Oregon Normal school student, one assigned at large in Jackson county and one to northern California.

Miss Belle Casey White, founder of the school and conductor for the past several years, will be here again in charge of the school. Miss White belongs to the Pratt Art Institute of Brooklyn, New York.

The local Woman's Christian Temperance Union presented a Lincoln Anniversary program on Tuesday at the Christian church. Rev. Chas. D. Gaffney of the Congregational church gave a talk on World Peace. The remainder of the program consisted of tributes to Lincoln, Washington and Frances E. Willard, long president of the organization. 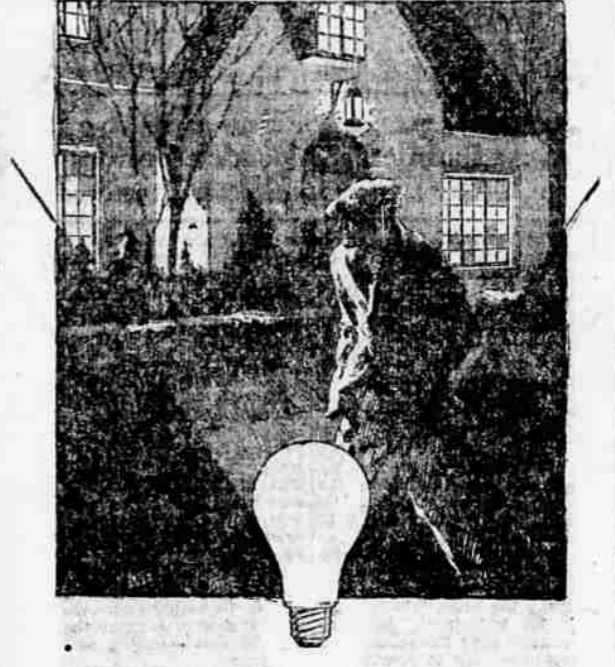
