The air is demolishing the gigantic Zeppelin plant at Friedrichshafen, to arrange construction of a super-

boat. This ship, to be ready in 1931, is intended "to establish trans-Atlantic air service as reliable as a railroad." If the Germans do not succeed this time, they will keep on until they do succeed.

The Senate votes to sell, for \$16,000,000, to Paul W. Chapman, 11 vessels belonging to the United States Shipping Board. One of these, the Leviathan, could not be built for \$16,000,000 with several millions added.

Uncle Sam, through his government, officially confesses his inability to run steamships. Intelligent Mussolini changed the saying about writing the songs of a nation and letting anybody else make the law. To him the important thing is to write the captions on films. That he does in connection with the signing of the Vati-

can treaty. Films were submitted to the Italian ruler, who wrote what was to be said at the showing.

It is expected, in Rome, that the pope will leave the Vatican in June to make a formal call on the Italian king at the Quirinal palace. That will terminate the pope's imprisonment within the Vatican limits that has lasted nearly 60 years.

The cold wave spreads in Europe, reaching Italy. The Riviera and Rome are covered with snow. All waterways, except in Spain, are icebound.

Fuel shortage is acute, schools in Berlin close for a week and 200 are reported dead of cold.

Meanwhile, thousands of coal miners are idle in Wales and elsewhere in Britain.

Trotsky, once ruler of Russia's army, is said to be a prisoner in the soviet consulate in Constantinople. Trotsky would like to go to Germany to discuss with communists there the possibility of making Russia what he would call "truly communist" according to Lenin's ideals.

Unfortunately for him, Russia may decide to send him on a much longer journey.
