NEW BLIZZARD SWOOPS UPON MIDDLE EUROPE

Ice and Snow From Siberia Adds to Suffering—Coal, Gas and Electricity Shortage—Berlin Schools Closed By Cold.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—A new blizzard bringing ice and snow was swooping down upon central Europe from the Siberian steppes and the east.

Shortage of coal, gas, electricity and water developed as the intense cold from which the continent has suffered continued with little lessening. Hope, arising from slight rises in temperatures in Germany was counteracted by forecasts of the new cold weather.

For England warmer weather was predicted, but present conditions caused extreme discomfort and suffering. Freezing of water mains has made it necessary for thousands of Britons to obtain their drinking water from temporary stand pipes in the streets.

Freezing of a gas main and the danger of artificial thawing left downtown Berlin without gas for fuel and lighting yesterday. Ice disabled the power station at Cere-lau, where it was 20 degrees below zero, fahrenheit, and that city was without electricity.

All schools at Berlin have been closed, and water and food shortages have developed. These have given rise to considerable rioting, raising and speculation which authorities are combating.

Zagreb, Yugoslavia, reported 30 villages near there buried under an enormous snowfall. Transportation facilities were disrupted and authorities were unable to send food which was seriously needed.

At one village five apples were found dead after they had, it was said, been hanging in peasants' homes, as food for shelter.

Intense cold persisted in France where there was considerable ice on the River Seine.

SMOKE BAN APPROVED FOR EUGENE CO-EDS BY LEAGUE LEADERS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON. The resolution reads: "Resolved, that it is the policy of the League against smoking in public places, which is a resolution passed by the Women's League, has been approved by the heads of the women's organizations. This resolution was presented by Edith Dodge of Ashland, who is president of the Women's League.

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Another thing which the university executive council has been attempting to stamp out is the practice of many university women playing cards all afternoon in eating places. This is considered harmful to good grades.

Letters have been sent to owners of all restaurants and eating places in Eugene, asking them to cooperate with the university officials by requesting college women not to smoke in their business places.

Dean Trustman, dean of women, has announced that if sorority houses are left open during spring vacation, an approved chaperone must be present.

DUNNE TELEPHONE MEMORIAL VOTED

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 16.—(AP)—Under the suspension of rules, the house Saturday morning passed the Dunne telephone memorial which was returned by the resolutions committee with a favorable report. Carlin of Jackson county asked for the passage of the memorial as a courtesy to the senate which has passed the house memorial, bearing the names of Hazlett, Potter and Carlin, and which differs from this memorial only that the Dunne memorial applies to a specific investigation started by Hiram Johnson.

Only two votes were cast against the adoption of the Dunne memorial. Those voting unfavorably were Ansell of Multnomah and Johnson of Benton.

LINDBERGH FORCED DOWN BY WEATHER

CAPE HATTERAS, N. C., Feb. 16.—(AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh was forced down at Hatteras in his coast guard station about 15 miles south of Cape Hatteras this afternoon because of heavy fog and rain. The plane was not damaged.

FAST TO DRIVE DEVIL FROM FATHER MAY END IN STARVATION

WIMA, Ohio, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Fred Conrad, 27, today entered the last week of life allotted him if he continues a hunger strike, now in its 23rd day, aimed at "driving the devil" from his father George Conrad who stands at his bedside for hours begging his son to take food in the hope of saving his life.

Conrad's father blamed the Rev. Mr. Ray Dodson, revivalist, for his son's fast. He has despaired of inducing his son to eat, and declared he believed the minister the only person capable of obtaining his consent to take food.

Conrad weighs 145 pounds, 55 pounds less than he weighed when he took up the fast. Physicians have given him not more than a week to live if he continues.

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RICHFIELD WILL SPEND BIG SUM STATE BEACONS

PORTLAND, Feb. 16.—(AP) Geo. H. Gage, Portland manager for Richfield Oil company, said today that more than three million dollars will be expended in Oregon by the company in the construction of its largest units for combining aviation beacons and better distribution facilities for the company's products.

The first of the units will be constructed one mile west of Crown Point on the Columbia river highway.

Other sites selected are Salem, Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Hood River.

Work on the first unit will begin as soon as permission is secured from Multnomah county commissioners.

The general contract has been let to a Los Angeles firm, Gaze said, although sub-contractors will be used on each unit.

Each plant will be of Spanish architecture with a 125-foot beacon tower.
