GRANTS PASS ANGLER WINS FISH CONTEST

Shilman Van Cott of Grants Pass, won the fourth prize in the rainbow-trout division of the 1928 national fishing contest conducted by "Field and Stream."

Van Cott took fourth place in the contest for a 12 lbs. 6 oz. trout caught in the Rogue river on November 15, 1928.

Hundreds of skillful anglers all over the country entered the annual national fishing contest, and Mr. Van Cott's prize winner brought him not only a valuable award but also high honor in the angling world. Full results of the contest and of Mr. Van Cott's catch are printed in the March issue of "Field and Stream."

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
