Suit for \$12,751.50 was filed in the federal district court at Portland last Thursday by Ruth K. Ray and George D. Ray, owners of a ranch on the Klamath river, against the California-Oregon Power company and the American Trust company to recover damages alleged to have been done their property. The plaintiffs say they have been irrigating their farm by gravity flow from the Klamath river and that with B. E. Korna had built a dike to prevent overflow. 


