COPCO HEAD OFF FOR O.S.C. SCHOOL

Clyde R. Higgins of the Copco commercial department leaves today for Corvallis to attend the Rural Electric Service Men's school at O. S. C. during the coming week. The school which is sponsored by the Oregon committee on relations of electricity to agriculture will feature a comprehensive study of the ways and means in which electricity may be profitably used on the farm to the economic advantage of the farmer. They will also work on plans to make the electrification of rural territory more general to the mutual benefit of the farmer and the utility.

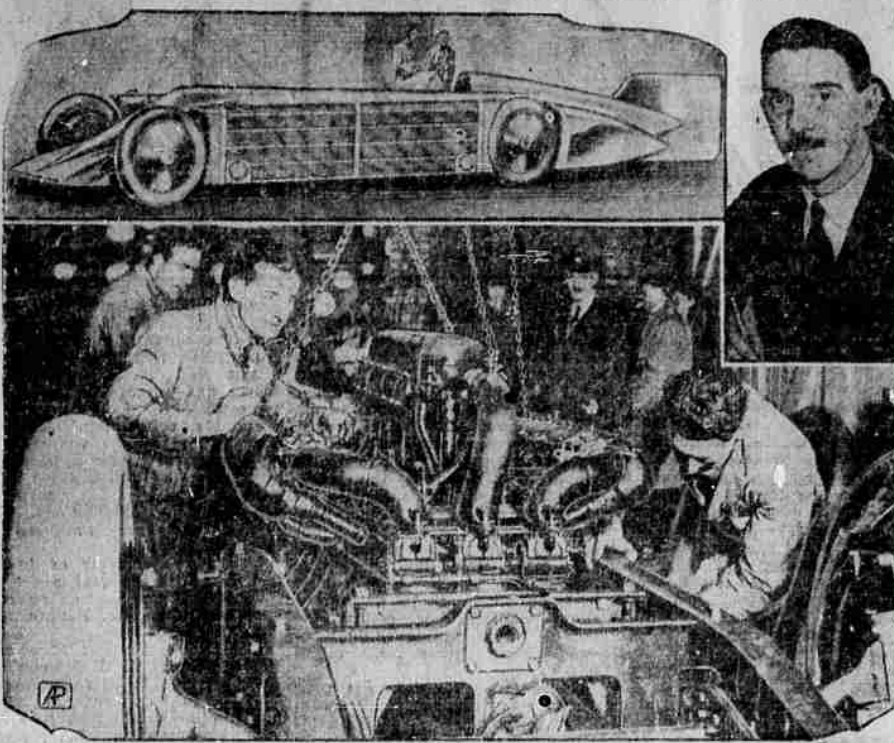
The rural electrification staff at O. S. C. has been making a series of tests and experiments along these lines and will discuss the results of their findings with the utility representatives who are engaged in rural electric work.

Mr. Higgins who is an associate member of the American Society of Agriculture Engineers handles this type of work for the California Oregon Power Company.

OREGON SUFFERS DEFEAT BY LONE POINT TO U. S. C.

SEATTLE, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The powerful University of Washington yearling basketball team downed the University of Oregon Freshmen 28 to 29 here tonight.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 16.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team lost its fifth Pacific coast conference game tonight by dropping a neck-to-neck game to Washington State, 29 to 28.

After lagging during the first few seconds of play, the Oregons developed into a matter of skill as the Webfoots tossed basket for basket with Washington. At the half Oregon led by one point, 15 to 14.

With seven minutes left to play, Mitchell, Washington State reserve center, led in a field goal to give the Cougars a one point edge. Eberhart retaliated with a long one from the field and Bohrer, Cougar guard, converted a free throw to reach the 27 to 27 tie. McDonald gave the invaders the decisive two point.
