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# ROTARY ENDORSES OLD SOLDIERS OF AIRPORT PROPOSAL AT NOON MEETING

The Rotary club endorsed the proposed new airport at today's meeting, following talks given by W. A. (Bill) Gates and Seeley Hall, and appointed a committee to work actively with the chamber of commerce airport committee in support of the bill which will come up at the April 2 election.

That the \$129,000 in bonds necessary to secure and develop the new airport for Medford, will be handled and expended thru the city council, rather than thru any airport committee, was a point brought out at today's meeting by Mr. Hall.

The revenue to be received from rental and storage leases on the new field, is becoming rapidly assured, thru a steady increase of applications from all over the state and from other states. Even applications for rights to run jitneys from Medford to the airport are now in the hands of the committee and will prove an added source of income, which, after the first five years, will not only take care of the interest, but will provide a sinking fund to pay off the bonded indebtedness, according to local authorities.
