## RADIUM HOOKS TO LURE OCEAN FISH

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Radium covered hooks that fish will be able to see in the darkness of the ocean are being used for the first time by William Beebe in an oceanographic expedition in Bermuda on which he will sail on March 13.

Another innovation planned is the attaching of sounding wires to fish nets to enable those above to know when a catch is made. He said he planned a more thorough coming of the ocean beam than ever had been made before. ## Pollard Recalls Famous Characters of Trail of '98; Shared Camp With Robt. Service and Bunked With Bishop

Friends made in the Klondike country will stay with one forever," declared R. H. Pollard, whose reminiscences over his experiences on "the trail of '98" centering around a few of the outstanding characters he met at that time, more than upon the actual search for gold.

Robert Service, the famous Yukon poet, shared a camp with Mr. Pollard one night—each of them having landed on the banks of a stream at the same time. They used the same fire, shared their supplies, and in the morning parted over different trails never to see each other again.

"He was rather young looking and slight at that time, and reminded me of a middle western farm boy, more than anything else," said Mr. Pollard's description of the well known poet.

"Then there was good old Jack Miller, father of my Ann Miller, of Seattle, who married the maharaja of India," recounted Mr. Pollard. "I knew Jack to live on horse meat up there for two weeks. Jack was a great friend, and as likeable a man as I've ever met—just a good natured, outgoing, roughneck, with an Irish ring in him," he said.

Mrs. Miller, according to Mr. Pollard, was the daughter of a French chef, who cooked in a restaurant in Valdez.

"She had her heart set on capturing one of the wealthy miners, and she got Jack. Jack and I eventually had made a strike on one of the richest placer gold mines in Alaska, realizing over \$500,000 out of it. His money didn't spoil his disposition, but his marriage almost did," said Mr. Pollard.

"Yes—I met Nancy Ann when she was a little girl. Jack was very fond of her. She was a nice, friendly little kid," he added. "The miner told of Bishop Rowe, Episcopal clergyman who traveled all through Alaska with his dog team, and was beloved by everyone.

**Bunked With Bishop**  
"One night I was asleep in an overcrowded roadhouse, when the proprietor came in and asked if Bishop Rowe might share my bed with me, as he had just arrived from a long distance and every place was crowded.

"I said, 'sure thing. I never slept with a preacher before, but I don't object to him, and I moved over and made room for him. He and I were always good friends from then on. He had one of the most delightful senses of humor, and the most understanding hearts I've ever known in a man," said the miner.

GOLD HILL, Ore., Feb. 20.—(Special)—The Lively Lime Products company's works on Kanes creek near Gold Hill are now in full swing. The poles are now set, the lines strung, and electricity is now being taken to the plant from the Kanes creek road.

One of the motors is being used to run the compressor, and the other, an exceptionally large one, being used to run the new electric hoist. The hoist has just been installed and enables the plant to increase production.
