TRAINING SCHOOL FOR SCOUT WORK THURSDAY NIGHT

Thursday night at the Boy Scout headquarters the second session of the scoutmasters' training school will be held.

The local Boy Scout council is again conducting a school for boy leaders so that all boys may find opportunity for participation in the Boy Scout program. It is the purpose of the organization to make sure of results in relation to energy expended by having every man connected with the leadership of the troops a thoroughly trained leader.
