STENOGRAPHER CANNOT TESTIFY AGAINST BOSS UNDER BILL BY BRIGGS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 21.—(AP)—The bill "designed to create a further confidential relationship between a stenographer and her employer," according to Representative Briggs, was passed by the house Wednesday afternoon. The bill, senate bill 151, provides that a stenographer cannot be a witness against her employer on matters pertaining to information received in an official capacity. The house also passed the Halley bill, which declares the industrial accident fund to be a trust fund for mesd declared by the industrial accident commission act and de-

claring all contributions heretofore made by the state of Oregon to said fund to be a trust in which the state has no proprietary ownership rights to claim. Settlemier's bill providing for the licensing of nursery men under the supervision of the state board of horticulture, was also passed by the house. A \$15 fee provision is included in the bill.
