MAN TO BE USED BY DOCTORS FOR CANCER STUDIES

CHICAGO—(AP)—Cancer, man's bane, is due for an exhaustive study to determine its relation to heredity among human beings.

For the first time in the history of the scientific method and not animals will come under the research microscope for a systematic study.

Previously animals and especially mice, have been subjects of laboratory analysis to determine the influence of heredity on the recurrence of cancer.

Dr. Bowman C. Crowell of Chicago is chairman of the committee of 12 surgeons who will supervise the compilation of statistics.

Family histories of patients under observation then will be studied and a record kept of the health of children of present sufferers.

BILL WOULD BAR SOLID TIRES FOR STATE HIGHWAYS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 21.—(AP)—Solid tire trucks will not be permitted on the Oregon highways after July 1, 1931, if house bill 214 which passed the house Wednesday, becomes a law.

The bill passed by the house, originated in the two roads committees of the house and is the result of several years study by Emmett Howard of Lane, chairman on the roads and highways committee, and several other committee members.

Load limits on solid tire vehicles will be reduced after January 1, 1930 from 20,000 pounds, the present limit, to 18,000.

When the solid tire prohibition becomes effective in two years, the load limit will be raised to 22,000 pounds.

Pneumatic tires are claimed to be self-polishing, as the owner who overloads harms his own tires.
