CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 23.—(AP)—Washington University basketball team kept its conference record clean tonight by winning the final game from Oregon State 25 to 23. The game was pulled out of the fire by the Huskies in the last few minutes after the lead had changed many times.

Oregon State opened the scoring when Aase sank a field goal. The score was tied three times in the first half but Washington led 20 to 19. With seven minutes to go the score was 28 all and Washington started a scoring spree with three baskets and a free throw.

HALDEMAN ENDS AIR DASH FROM SNOW TO PALMS

HAVANA, Cuba, Feb. 23.—(AP)—George Haldeaman today linked Canada and Cuba by a single unbroken airplane flight. In taking off from the Walkerville airport near Windsor, Ontario, at 3:49, the wheels of his airplane were deep in the snow. He set them down less than 13 hours later on the tropical soil of Cuba.

Haldeaman, accompanied by Jax P. Hayden, a mechanic, on his southward flight passed over Cincinnati and Atlanta. He flew over Tampa at 1:12 p. m. and Key West at 3:55 p. m. His charted course of 1494 miles was flown in 12 hours and 56 minutes. There remained in his Bellanca plane enough fuel to have carried him another 125 miles.

Haldeaman succeeded where Leonard Flo of Ann Arbor, Mich., twice failed, once because of fog and once because of illness. Haldeaman, who was pilot for Ruth Elder in her unsuccessful attempt to cross the Atlantic, showed no signs of fatigue from his long flight.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—(AP)—The entire machinery of the stock market rested today. The Saturday closings two years ago, and those of last spring, were for the purpose of catching up with back business, and commission houses and investment bankers' offices hummed with activity as usual.

The banks were open for the usual Saturday half day, but as all securities markets, and all of the commodity markets with the exception of wheat, followed the stock exchange's example in taking a three-day holiday from Washington's birthday to Monday, Wall Street was a Sunday aspect.

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala

Feb. 23.—(AP)—The Santa Maria volcano which recently became active after several severe earthquakes, is reported to be hurling ashes and sand over the southern coast of Guatemala.

Many of the shops and restaurants of the financial district had decided that business would not warrant staying open.

Much of the gloom that pervaded speculative sentiment when the stock exchange was closed two weeks ago, while the federal reserve boards warning against excessive use of credit for speculation was fresh, had been lifted by today, and traders enjoyed their holiday in a more peaceful frame of mind. The drop in stock prices appeared to have been checked. The volume of business fell off during the week to the 3,000,000 share day average.
