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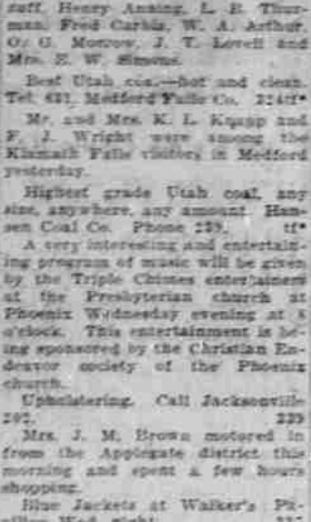
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MID-WEST SOCIETY FOLK WINTER IN SOUTHLAND

Youth is Served. Since our hero purchased his seat, the price of memberships has gone up to more than \$600,000. Even when the memberships are increased shortly from 1190 to 1375, it is estimated that each will be worth at least half a million dollars.
