NATIONAL ORIGINS X-RAY ART WORK PROVISIONS WOULD IN EFFORT PROVE CUT ALIEN INFLUX TITLE SLANDERED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—President Coolidge Wednesday transmitted to congress a report prepared by government statisticians showing that if the national origins provisions of the immigration act became operative, immigration would be reduced by approximately 11,000 under the present total of 164,647, which is based upon the 1890 census.

The report was prepared by statisticians of the state, commerce and labor departments. It estimated that under the national origins clause, the total number of immigrants would be 153,714.

The report was forwarded without recommendations.

Present immigration quotas are based upon the 1890 census figures. Unless legislation is enacted by congress, this basis will be maintained July 1, by the national origins plan for computing allotments.

TEXAS CONGRESSMAN ACQUITTED OF FRAUD

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 28.—(AP)—A jury in the district criminal court here early today acquitted Augustus J. McCloskey, democratic congressman-elect from the 11th district, of charges of fraud at the November election.

McCloskey still faces four indictments charging fraud at the election, which his attorneys are assumed they would ask the court to set for immediate trial. All of the cases against the congressman-elect were brought here from Texas courts on charge of venue.

McCloskey said he would leave for Washington Monday to arrange details incident to presentation of his credentials to the house.
