# OREGON ARMY DOG HAD GOOD RECORD

SALEM, Ore.—(P)—Record of the formal discharge of a dog from the United States army has been found in the adjutant general's office here. Tip, a bull pup, was officially mustered out of the service from Company L, Second Oregon Infantry, at San Francisco, August 7, 1899, after having served a year and four months in the Spanish-American war. Tip participated in the capture of Manila, April 12, 1898, and several other engagements. He was credited with having "caught chickens for the company when grub was scarce on the firing line."
