CONSCIENCE FUND OF U. S. TREASURY EXCEEDS \$500,000

WASHINGTON -- (AP) Treasury officials are confronted with many difficult problems, but one that never has been solved is just how much case is given the troubled consciences of thousands of contributors to the conscience fund, which now aggregates \$568,694.61. Back in 1811 when Albert Gallatin of Pennsylvania was fourth secretary, serving the longest term any secretary has had as financial head of the government, a person whose name was never divulged sent \$250 to the treasury to pay for some wrong done the government. Whether it was for failure to pay taxes, for theft or for something else never was learned, but the money was put in a fund marked as having come from unidentified persons.

Since then thousands of contributions of a similar nature have been received. Generally contributions are accompanied by statements to the effect that it is for payment for defrauding the government or for oversight in failing to make the proper payment. Occasionally, however, the anonymous writer will admit it is for a minor theft. A New Yorker sent \$500 to the treasury and to make certain that it would reach the proper fund he took five \$100 bills and cut them exactly in the center, sending one-half of each to Secretary Mellon and the other half to the collector of internal revenue. Neither half could have been redeemed by the treasury without the other half as the treasury requires two-thirds of a mutilated bill for redemption. Since 1827 there never has been a year in which some sort of an increase in the fund has not been received.

EXPECT CHAPLIN BACK TO STUDIO AFTER SICKNESS

LOS ANGELES, March 1. -- (AP) Charlie Chaplin, noted motion picture comedian and producer, today apparently had won his fight against ptomaine poisoning and intestinal influenza. His studio representatives said they expected that he would be able to return to his work next week. Chaplin was stricken with ptomaine last Monday while at his studio, when the battle against poisoning appeared won. Intestinal influenza developed as a complication. His temperature during the crisis rose to 104 1/2 degrees, but last night it had dropped to normal. Dr. Cecil Reynolds, Chaplin's physician, visited the Chaplin home only once yesterday. He expressed himself as confident that preventive measures taken would stave off more serious illness. Radio reports, apparently from the east, that Chaplin was dead, caused great commotion in both the Chaplin home and studio. The comedian-producer's representatives issued formal statements, declaring Chaplin "very much alive" and in no danger.

HIAWATHA, Kas. -- (AP) -- Dolores Jane and Phyllis Elaine look alike, as twins should, but one baby is a native of Nebraska and the other is a true daughter of Kansas. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Snyder, live on a farm near the Kansas-Nebraska border. The stock visiting the Snyders twice in one day brought Phyllis Elaine to the farm and then left Dolores at a hospital in Falls City, Neb.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 1. (AP) Little hope was held today for the recovery of Jimmie Huston, 18, shot Sunday night by a police officer. The policeman said young Huston attempted to escape after he had been surprised while peering into the window of an east side residence. The bullet entered near the hip and tore through several folds of intestine.
