## BUILDING PROGRAM GOOD LAST MONTH

The month of February had a building program twice that of January, according to figures compiled at the city building office yesterday afternoon, revealing the sum of \$85,325 spent here for new buildings and for repairing old structures. Thirty-one permits were issued and of this number 16 were for new construction, including the new city fire hall and a \$15,000 home under construction for Hamilton Patton.

Preparations were reported today to be progressing satisfactorily for the big American Legion boxing smoker to be held at the armory a week from next Monday with Sailor Jack Wood arranging the bouts. He has plans of using Pat Padelford in the main event, preferably against Willie Rosander of Ashland, if the latter will consent to meet the local man.

## CIVIL SUIT TRIAL IN JUSTICE COURT

A civil action brought against L. L. Hatfield and F. A. Upton of Central Point by Jean Wolkins of the same city was being tried in Justice court today. The plaintiff claims to have a sum of approximately \$115 due for horses the defendants rented from him for a hunting trip last October.

The plaintiff claims further he was to receive \$3 per horse per day while in the keeping of the defendants, who instead claim they understood the price to be 50 cents per horse or \$3 for the entire five per day. The plaintiff was represented by Kelly & Kelly and the defendants by W. G. Trill.

## TOP BUTTER HELD UNCHANGED WHILE STANDARDS GO UP

PORTLAND, Ore., March 1.—(AP)—While the top grade of butter remained unchanged, the two next grades, standards and prime firsts, advanced half a cent each today. Standards stepped up to 44 1/2c and prime firsts to 44c. Firsts held at 42c.

Eggs remained unchanged. Meat and poultry prices were active. In chickens, springs advanced from 25c to 26 to 28c and broilers came on the market at 32 to 34c. Springs had been selling at 25c. They are about done for now, and it is hardly likely that the present supply will hold out till the broilers grow up. Peking ducks went up from 25c to 26 and 28c.

Fresh pork took a ride from 14c and 14 1/2c to 15c and 15 1/2c and was still scarce at those quotations. A small crumb of consolation, choice vealers topped a bit, going from 21c and 22c down to 20c to 21c. More of this meat is reaching the market.

The prices quoted are dealers' buying prices. Fruits and vegetables remained unchanged.
