CAVES ATTRACTION TO RECEIVE MUCH NEEDED ATTENTION

Good news for southern Oregon is that not only has the bill authorizing an appropriation of \$35,000 for improvements for the Oregon Caves been passed by congress and is awaiting the signature of President Coolidge, but that the work of widening the last section of the forest highway into the Oregon Caves resort will be started in a few days by the federal bureau of public roads with its own forces.

The equipment has been shipped and a crew of 15 to 20 men will be employed. Forty thousand dollars has been set aside for this improvement of 11.7 miles. The widening is a continuation of the work started last spring, and the road will be widened to a 14-foot standard. The grading will be carried on so as to interfere as little as possible with traffic, and it will be completed before the tourist season opens.

This forest road improvement is, of course, independent of the improvements that will be made under the \$35,000 improvement bill awaiting the president's signature. There seems to be no doubt what ever felt that President Coolidge will sign the bill. The improvements that will come from this \$35,000 will include a lighting system for the caves and new buildings and other innovations for the caves resort.

All this gives much impetus to the movement under way for some time past for a new road from Medford to the Oregon Caves through the Williams creek district.

AIR USE SPEEDING EUROPEAN TRANSIT

Both freight and passenger transportation has been speeded up by the network of air routes which today overcrossed Europe. The new flying time is about one-third that of the fastest train, and the rate is little more than the railroad's freight rates. The economy of time afforded by air travel is recognized by progressive business men, who have been quick to take advantage of the air service.

In transporting perishable freight, the air route often proves indispensable. Fresh flowers, for instance, are carried from Holland to many American cities. Millinery and tailors employ the airplane to bring the latest styles from Paris or Vienna. It is found safe and economical to ship jewelry or gold by air, since transportation time is so reduced that savings in insurance and interest render the trip cheaper than by rail. Valuables are regularly carried by air from Boston to western Europe.

The delivery of newspapers by airplane is a commonplace in many parts of Europe. Fleets of special planes are employed. Bundles of papers are dropped from the speeding planes, flying on regular schedules, so that the late editions are carried a hundred miles within an hour. Last year German air lines alone covered a distance of 5,222,200 miles and carried 32,000 passengers.

LEGION MEN WILL GATHER PORTLAND AT BIG CEREMONY

The greatest gathering of ex-service men ever seen in Oregon is being planned for March 18, when the \$1,500,000 veterans' bureau hospital on Marquam hill in Portland will be officially dedicated. Preliminary arrangements were discussed at a meeting yesterday in the clubhouse of Portland post of the American Legion, between Dr. Paul L. Carter, medical officer in charge at the hospital; Carl E. Moser, department adjutant of the American Legion; Joseph O. Freck, chief of care of the Portland veterans of the 49th society; Colonel A. E. Clark and T. Walter Gilford.

American Legion bands and drum corps from all parts of the state will be drawn in with delegations of Legionnaires. Veterans of Foreign Wars and Disabled American Veterans with post colors participating in the parade which will precede the ceremonies.

In the morning a conference of American Legion commanders and adjutants from the 30 posts of the state will be held at the Multnomah hotel and in the evening a banquet will be held under the auspices of the "49th" society. Following the dedication ceremonies in the afternoon at the veterans' hospital a plaque on the new Doernbecher hospital will be unveiled in honor of the American Legion, which helped make the project possible.

TIME FOR SPRAY SCALE AND MITE IS NOW AT HAND

The time is at hand for the application of the most spray for control of San Jose scale and pear leaf blister mite. On account of the good weather and dry soil condition it would be well for every grower to take advantage of the opportunity and apply his spray as early as possible.

Liquid lime sulfur, testing 25 degrees Baumé gives best results when used one gallon to eight gallons of water or 24 gallons in a 200-gallon spray tank.

Oil emulsion, if used, should be diluted so that the result is four parts oil to six gallons of water.

When dry lime sulfur is used, it will take four pounds of the dry material to equal one gallon of the 45-degree tested liquid, thus the dilution would be 45 pounds to 100 hundred gallons of water.

Blister mite is controlled only when the lime sulfur spray is applied before the buds break open. With this in mind, those having mite infested orchards should not delay their spraying operations too long.

The most important factor contributing to the success of scale control is the application. One can not be too thorough in covering the entire surface of all twigs, branches and trunk.
