

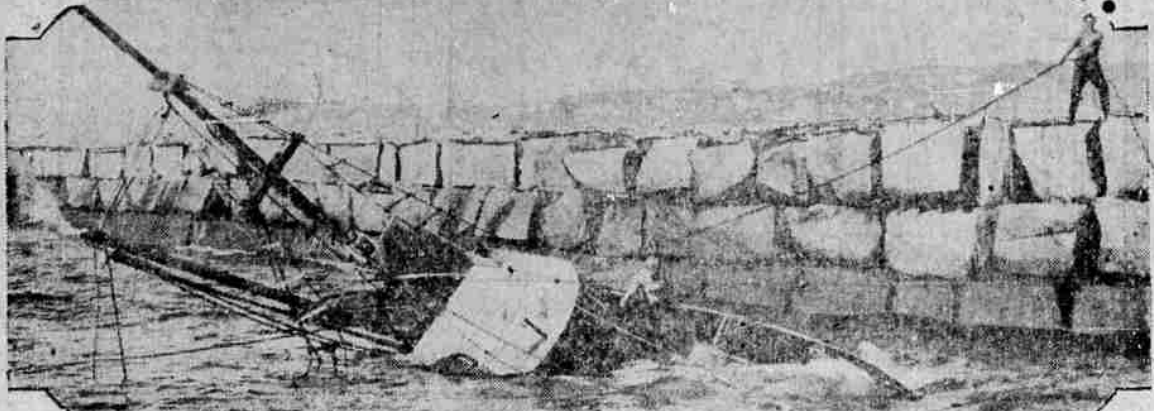
# NEWS of the DAY in PICTURES

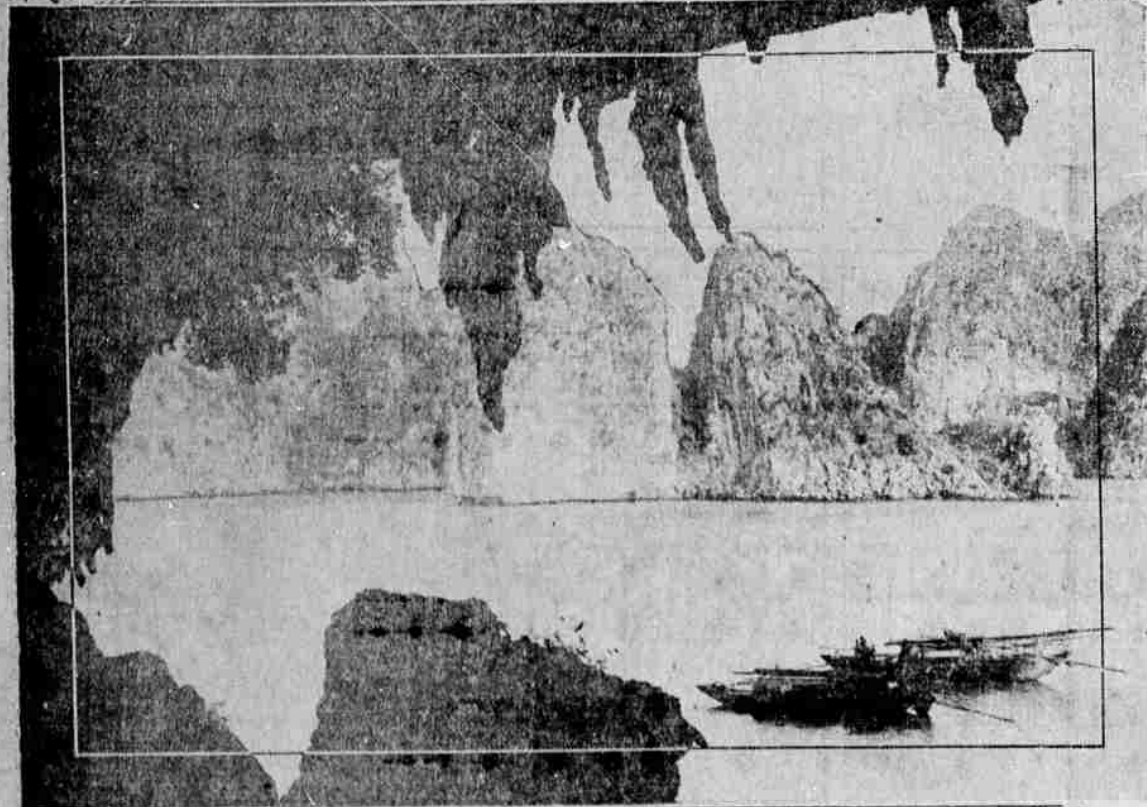

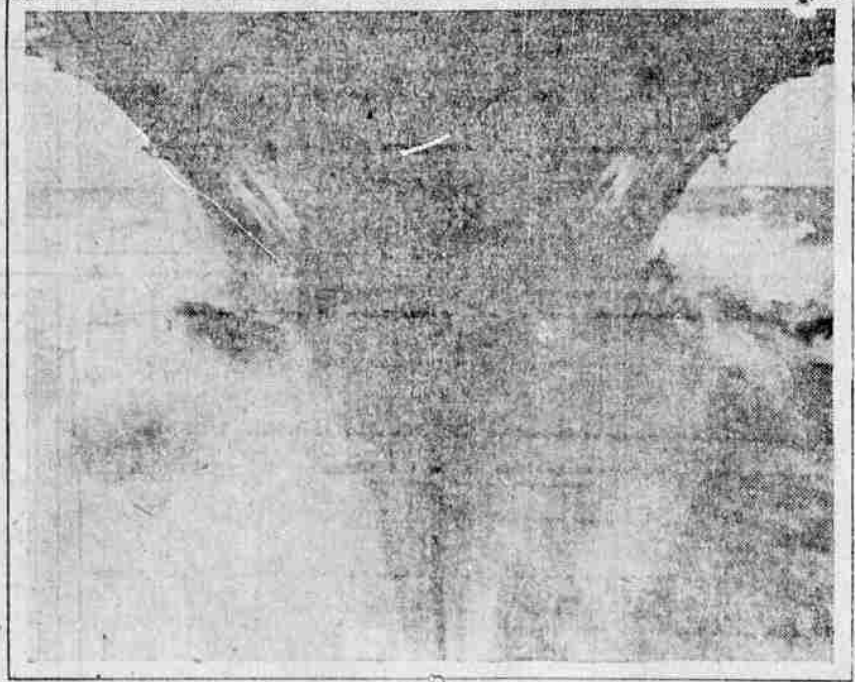

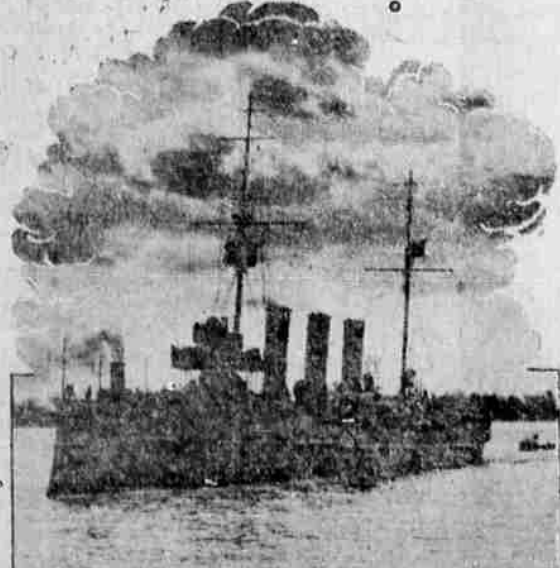
