

EXTENSIVE WORK ON COUNTY ROADS STARTS APRIL 1ST

HOLD INSPECTION OF CO. A. TONIGHT IN LOCAL ARMORY

The road program for the coming season in this county, as far as general road work is concerned, is still under consideration by the county court, but under special levies and market roads there will be extensive activity. The county court expects to make the second of its tours of inspection of county roads this week.

All of the market road construction and practically all of the special levy roads will be built in the eastern section of the county.

The market roads are the Lake Creek market road, upon which approximately \$5,000 will be expended, and the Dead Indian market road, upon which practically \$30,000 will be spent. Both these roads when completed will furnish routes to Lake of the Woods.

The Butte Falls district has voted about \$15,000 in special levies. The money will be used in the completion of the 26-mile road to Prospect, and the building of a road to the logging operations of the Owen-Oregon lumber camps.

The Prospect district has voted about \$25,000 for road work, all leading into the Crater Lake highway. They will be all-year roads, and besides proving beneficial to residents of the districts, will open up new recreational country.

The Eagle Point district has voted \$5000 for the improvement of the road on the south fork of Little Butte creek.

Residents of the Rogue River district have petitioned the county court for the elimination of two railroad crossings on a main road of that section. If right of way can be obtained the petition will be granted. It involves the construction of about a mile of new road.

County Engineer Paul Rynning said today that he expects the special levy road work to be in full swing by April 1.

No definite program will be adopted for the general road fund until the matter of the Midway highway is decided. The petition for this road will have the first reading at the session of the county court Wednesday.

The annual federal inspection of Company A, 186th Infantry, will be held this evening at the armory, with Major C. M. McMurray, 7th Infantry, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., as the inspecting officer. Accompanying Major McMurray is Captain George W. Hirsch, ordnance department, U. S. army, Presidio, San Francisco, who will inspect all arms and ordnance of the company.

Major McMurray was formerly attached to the Oregon National Guard as inspector of the 186th Infantry, but for the past few months has been assigned to Vancouver Barracks.

The annual federal inspection of Company A is the one big event of the year, and in preparation for the inspection all the members of the company have been drilling hard for the past few weeks and also have been getting all equipment and personnel in tip-top order. A full attendance of the organization is anticipated tonight and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Inspection will be held on the floor of the armory from 8 to 10 p. m. Members of Company A who have been out of the city have been arriving in order to be present, the commanding officer of the company having issued strict instructions to every member to be present, no excuses being permitted.

Company A, 186th Infantry, now has 60 men and three officers on its rolls and it is expected that the inspection this evening will rate high, as every effort has been exerted to have the organization up to the highest point it has been in years. Besides inspecting the company and its equipment, Major McMurray will also inspect the new rifle range recently completed and will forward his report of the activities of the local unit of the National Rifle club.

LONGEVITY APOSTLE HALEY FISKE, DIES

NEW YORK, March 4.—(AP)—Haley Fiske, president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company and apostle of longevity, died yesterday as he was about to alight from his automobile at his Park avenue home. He was returning from church. Death was attributed to a blood clot in the heart. He was 77 years old.

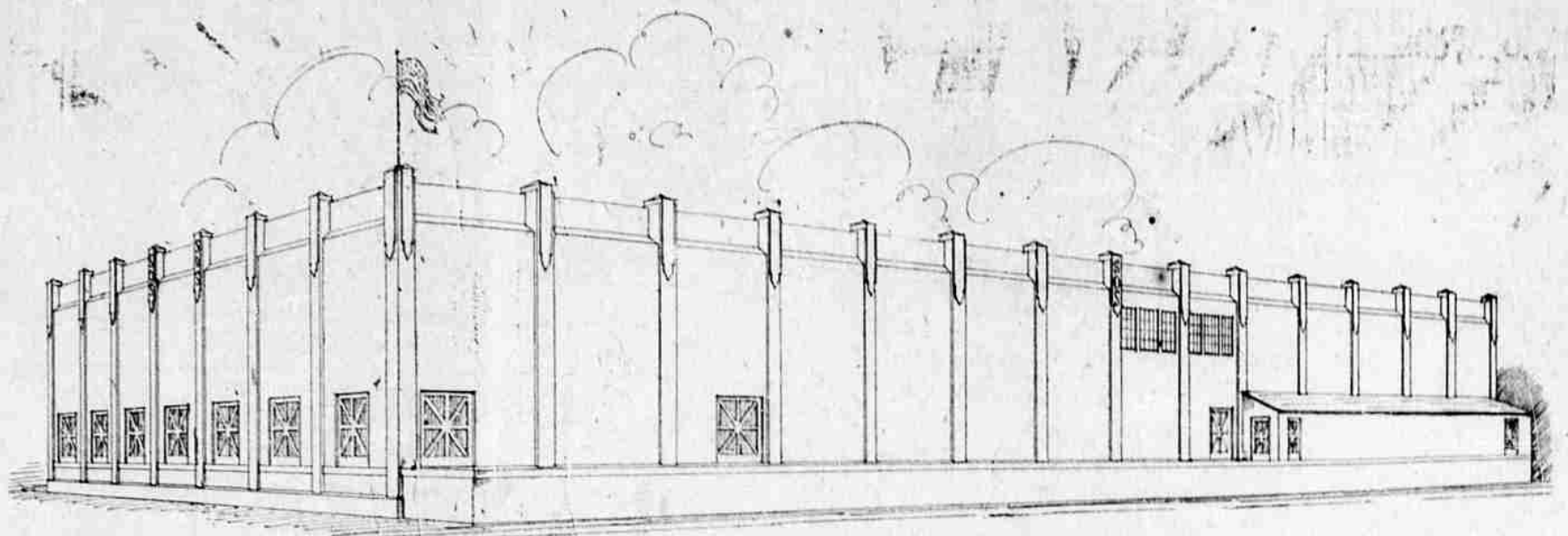
In accordance with the habits of living which he advocated as president of the life extension institute, he submitted to periodical physical examinations. He was pronounced in sound health by physicians two months ago.

Drawing of New \$200,000 Pre-Cooling and Packing Plant of Southern Oregon Sales, Inc.

Work started last week upon the construction of the \$200,000 storage and packing plant of the Southern Oregon Sales, Inc., at Stewart avenue and Pacific highway. It will be a model plant of its kind, and one of the largest on the Pacific Coast. Final details of the plant's equipment are now being completed by S. O. S. officials.

The plant will have a refrigeration capacity of 100 tons, and space for the storage of 20 cars per day, and will be able to handle 10,000 boxes of fruit per day. The power requirements will exceed 400 horse power. The plant will be equipped so there will be no re-handling of the fruit; all fruit boxes for storage will be stripped. The packing will be with packing machines, patented and developed by the Southern Oregon Sales, Inc. A new system of sorting machines, also developed by the concern, will be used, producing speed and efficiency, without bruising the fruit. The unloading will be by conveyors, with space for the handling of loose fruit. A section will also be reserved for the handling of packing supplies of all kinds.

The ventilation system will be modern in every detail, and a lighting engineer will be retained. By this system, excessive heat and glaring light will be eliminated.

The work of putting in the siding started this week, and will be completed within 10 days, when the hauling of building supplies will start.

SHOOTING NURSE FACES SENTENCE OF LIFE IN PEN

DENVER, Colo., Mar. 4.—(AP)—Farice King, Denver nurse, faced a life sentence in the state penitentiary today for killing her sweetheart, Patrolman Robert K. Evans.

A jury that deliberated nearly 24 hours convicted Miss King of first-degree murder.

In one of the most sensational criminal court scenes in recent years in Denver, the nurse, haggard and pale in appearance, collapsed without uttering a word when the verdict was read. She was carried from the court room to her cell in the county jail adjoining.

Lewis D. Mowray, her counsel, asked for 2 days in which to file a motion for a new trial. The prosecution acceded and the request was granted by District Judge Frank McDonough.

Miss King shot and killed Evans—known as John C. Bodzine before he came here—while he slept on a cot in the Denver General hospital. She then turned the revolver upon herself, inflicting a wound that physicians believed would prove fatal. Evans had been taken to the hospital after he had been wounded by Eddie Ives, con-

FIFTH FATALITY OF MENINGITIS EPIDEMIC

SEATTLE, Wash., March 4.—(AP)—Making the fifth fatality among the 11 persons taken from the liner President Lincoln suffering with spinal meningitis last week, Eugenio Pagliassori, Filipino, died last night at the city hospital. Of the seven patients left, the condition of two was reported serious by physicians.

No new cases have developed among the 135 third-class passengers and crew placed in quarantine when the liner docked here from the Orient.

MIAMI BEACH STORE ROBBED OF JEWELRY

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 4.—(AP)—Two heavily armed, unmasked robbers held up the Maynard Jewelry company store here today and escaped with jewelry estimated to be worth between \$50,000 and \$75,000. Police with riot guns took up the trail of a large green automobile in which they drove away.

MORROW RETURN MEXICO'S CAPITAL ACCOUNT REVOLT

MEXICO CITY, March 4.—(AP)—Ambassador Morrow, accompanied by Mrs. Morrow, his daughter, Anne and Elizabeth, and Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, his prospective son-in-law, arrived at the American embassy today from the Morrow residence at Cuernavaca, Ambassador Morrow had planned to remain at Cuernavaca until tomorrow, but news of the outbreak of a revolt caused his decision to return to the Mexican capital at once.

Farm Pointers

No farmer, says the Oregon experiment station, will knowingly keep and feed his valuable crops to cull livestock. The problem is to discover the cull, the solution of its disposal. Careful culling is not only desirable, but essential to profitable farming. The farmer, as well as the merchant, needs clearance sales to move his "dead" stock.

It is never too early to use the hoe on advancing crops, providing

the soil is in the right condition. A border of two feet leaves ample room for cultivation around the trees or the shrubs planted in the lawn. It may be advisable in Oregon to prune all shrubbery at this date and get it ready for the new spring growth, says the experiment station.

ting rid of body lice on fowls is to paint the top of the roosts, finds the experiment station. Painting with a small amount of nicotine sulfate kills not only the lice, but the mites as well. A small quantity will prove effective just before the chickens go to roost at night. This treatment is harmless to the chickens.

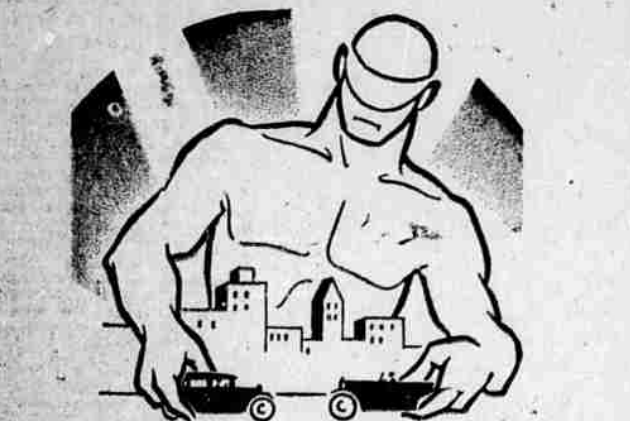
