

SENATE TO HEAR CABINET ROSTER TUESDAY SESSION

WASHINGTON, March 4.—(AP)—President Hoover will not send the nominations of his cabinet to the senate until tomorrow.

In this respect he will deviate from the custom of his immediate predecessors. Eight years ago today, President Harding's first act after delivering his inaugural address, was to appear before an executive session of the senate and present his nominations in person. They were confirmed the same day.

Mr. Hoover's decision made it possible for the new senate to recess until tomorrow, immediately after the vice-presidential inauguration was over.

MRS. HOOVER SELECTS DARK RED GOWN FOR INAUGURAL CEREMONY

WASHINGTON, March 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Herbert Hoover selected a velvet street gown of a very dark red or plum-colored shade for the inauguration. Her choice was made a little more than an hour before she departed with her husband for the capital.

The skirt of her dress was draped with circular ruffles and she wore a turban, coat and shoes of the same shade. Mrs. Herbert Hoover, Jr., selected as her costume a figured brown dress with a light tan entrecollet and a tan hat.

AIMEE STORY UPSET BY THAT OF MOTHER

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 4.—(AP)—Assemblyman William Hornblower and Clare Woolwine, two of the board of managers who will prosecute the impeachment of Judge Carlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles for misdemeanor in office, turned triumphantly from Portland last night declaring they have an affidavit from Minnie Kennedy that would "shoot all of holes" in the testimony of Hardy and Aimee Semple McPherson. Hornblower stated that Mrs. Kennedy had controverted a large part of the testimony given by Mrs. McPherson regarding the \$2,500 "love gift" check that Judge Hardy had admitted accepting from the evangelist and Mrs. Kennedy, one act upon which one of the five counts of impeachment against him is based.

(Continued from Page One.) Mr. Hoover took a seat in the center, with Mr. Coolidge on his left. Chief Justice Taft already was in his seat on the right.

Mrs. Hoover was shown to a seat to the right of her husband, and Mrs. Coolidge sat to the right of the retiring president's left. When all had quieted at last, the clerk of the supreme court, C. Elmer Cropley, stepped forward holding in his outstretched palm the little Bible upon which Mr. Hoover had chosen to seal his obligations. It was open at the chosen passage, Proverbs 29:18, saying: "Where there is no vision the people perish; but he that keepeth the law, happy is he." The selection was made overnight, for the incoming president had indicated previously he would ask that the book be opened at the fifth chapter of St. Matthew, the sermon on the mount. Hoover Repeats Oath Cropley handed the Bible to Chief Justice Taft, who advanced to Mr. Hoover's left, at the front of the platform. Holding the Bible in his left hand, the chief justice repeat-

At 1:50 o'clock the former president and his wife left the capitol for the union station to take a train for Northampton. There was handshaking and a wishing of good luck all around as they left the inaugural stand. Immediately afterward the new president and first lady of the land took their places in the foremost White House car of the line waiting to return as it rolled down Capitol Hill and a continuous roar of applause accompanied the party as it passed over the avenue with its cavalry escort at a trot. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hoover were kept smiling and waving in acknowledgment to the cheers from the rain-soaked sidewalk. The arrangement was for the presidential party to keep far enough in advance of the head of the parade so that Mr. and Mrs. Hoover could have a hasty luncheon in the White House before the head of the column arrived at the reviewing stand. President Hoover and his party took their places in the reviewing stand a few minutes before 3 o'clock. As he entered the rain had dwindled to a drizzle. When General Summerall, at the head of the parade, reached the reviewing stand, he saluted and President Hoover doffed his hat. Mrs. Hoover waved her hand to the grand marshal. A moment later the colors passed the presidential party and Mr. Hoover gave the regulation salute, with his hat at his breast. General Summerall left the procession a moment later and joined the party in the reviewing stand. The second division of the parade, made up of governors of states and various marching organizations approached the White House precincts shortly after 3:00 o'clock. Those in the stand there at that time seemed greatly interested in the air display above. Mrs. Hoover was in an animated mood and showed eagerness to see each feature of the colorful pageant.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, March 4.—(AP) A brisk selling movement in the stock market today was checked by the wave of buying which followed the publication of the Hoover inaugural message. The market opened irregularly higher, turned sharply downward in the late forenoon and then turned upward again. Early declines of 1 to 5 points were cut down, or wiped out, and a fairly long list of stocks sold 1 to 8 points higher, with about a dozen in new high ground. Mining shares changed hands in large volume at advancing prices.
