

BOGGS TELLS OF RAINY CEREMONY PAST INAUGURALS

Herbert Hoover is not the only "rainy weather" president of the United States. Others who took their oath of office in inclement weather were: Lincoln, Garfield, Harrison, Cleveland and McKinley, according to O. C. Boggs who conducted the "Inauguration Day" program for the Kiwanis club at Hotel Medford this noon.

Mr. Boggs recalled in his interesting talk that President Harrison lost his life as a result of a severe cold contracted when he appeared in the open to take his oath of office. When Andrew Jackson was inaugurated the ceremony was attended, according to the speaker, by friends of the president, who came for miles on flea-bitten horses to celebrate the occasion. Jackson was the first president to take the oath of office on the east porch of the capitol. This custom has been followed ever since. Mr. Boggs concluded his speech with an interesting sketch of the life of Herbert Hoover.

The musical program for the luncheon was furnished by Miss Curry, who sang a group of solos, accompanied by Miss Esther Church, music supervisor of the high school.

MANY SHOOTERS OUT FOR RIFLE COURSE

The Medford National Rifle club started its qualification courses yesterday with a large attendance between 9:30 and 12:30 p. m. on the National Guard range several miles east of the city. One member turned in an 83 per cent score, two an 80 per cent score, one a 78 per cent score and another a 70 per cent score, for as far over that portion of the course each had completed in the time stated above. The individual shooting ranges from 10 to 30 shots.

The course is the regulation army qualification course known as Course D, firing at long distances of 200 yards. The course comprises 50 shots for each contestant. It is planned for a longer session of shooting hereafter.

PETERSON TO BE REPRESENTATIVE FOR OIL OUTFITS

A. E. Peterson of this city will open an office in the laboratory building Tuesday where he will actively represent the Western Oil & Refining company and the Western Drilling & Producing company. For the past four and one-half years he has held the position of stock transfer agent for the California Oregon Power company with headquarters in Medford and is leaving the Copco organization to supervise the preferred and common stock selling activities of the Western companies in southern Oregon and northern California.

The Western Oil & Refining company is now expending three-quarters of a million dollars in building a marine terminal at Linton, near Portland. This company, according to Mr. Peterson, sell its products through independent dealers and distributors and is managed by former well known Sitka oil officials, including Richard Florian, who is president and manager of the Western organization.

GENERAL MILLS, INC. TO HANDLE PRODUCTS OF BIG COMBINATION

The Sperry Flour company of California, one of the Pacific coast's large milling organizations, has consolidated with the Washburn-Crosby company, millers of Gold Medal flour, forming a giant concern which will be known as the General Mills, Incorporated.

General Mills, Inc. is the largest single manufacturer of flour and cereal products, according to Art Endicott, manager of the Sperry Flour company in this territory. The combined facilities of the new combined manufacturers will include 21 flour mills with a capacity of 87,700 barrels of flour per day. Seven proprietary feed mills, two cereal food products mills and 21 branch sales offices and warehouses will be in operation.

The plans of the consolidation provide for the future operation of the Sperry properties under the present management.
