**LOCAL CHANCES BEST IN YEARS CAGE TOURNEY**

Five Leaders Picked for Hoop Honor Hope—Washington Not So Hot—Salem Touted as Strong Contender.

Tillamook, Astoria, Salem, Washington high of Portland and Medford are now recognized by upstate sport writers as the five leading contenders in the state basketball tournament, and Washington high, without the services of Ed Lewis, all-state center last year, is rated as the "weas" sister of the lot. Lewis' sole asset in his height and by virtue of a dispensation by the state athletic board is allowed to play in the tournament, but not in the games to decide the Portland championship.

Tillamook in a two-game series with Washington high won and lost and also broke even with Astoria. Both Tillamook and Astoria are "long shot" teams, and have the same teams as last year. Two of the stars on the Astoria squad shoot from mid-floor with appalling accuracy and Tillamook has a sharpshooter of no mean ability. The Salem team is regarded in this city as a strong contender as the fans figure Washington is not so hot, even with Lewis at center. Red McDonald, who knows all the tricks that Lewis knows, and maybe a few more, is rated as able to hold him down, and not be awed by his length. Lewis was a terror against weak teams last year but against a squad that followed him around was just a center.

The Salem team is a machine that keeps playing basketball and making points. The Medford team has the best chance in years to win the "big cup" with a veteran team, barring injuries and bursts of temperament. They are a good team, but have been reading the newspapers and listening to the gas tell how good they are and, of late, have been prone to pout in critical periods. Coach Callison allows he will have this fault eradicated by the time the tournament starts.

The drawings for the tournament will be held next Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock and the first games of the tournament will be played Wednesday evening.
