

CLEVELAND HURLER HAS CONTROL DEVICE

NEW ORLEANS, March 5.—(AP)—Willis Hurlin, the young Cleveland Indian pitcher who some times got rattled during the first inning last season, but delivered anything the catcher ordered from there on in, has an invention to overcome his mental hurdle. It's a "control board," a slab the size of the batting range, tilted up on stumps and surrounded by a net. Out in Parsons, Kas., this winter Hurlin spent his days throwing baseballs at the dummy, and says now he can hit it every crack. Rain is slowing down the Cleveland workouts.

PURDUE 'FLAG POLE' SCORES 143 POINTS

CHICAGO, Mar. 5.—(AP)—Charles "Stretch" Murphy, Purdue's six-foot-six scoring ace, holds the all-time western conference scoring record. Scoring eight field goals and six free throws against Ohio State at Lafayette last night, Murphy ran his season's total to 143 points, more than the mark of 132 set by Johnny Miner of Ohio State in 1925. With Glen Harneszen feeding the lanky Murphy, "Stretch" scored enough points in the first half to set a new record and then continued in the second period to slip through the loose Ohio State defense. Murphy has one more year of competition.

FRIGIDAIRE HEADS TO VISIT MEDFORD EN ROUTE TO MEET

E. C. Brochler, president and general manager of Frigidaire Corporation will head a party of twenty-five factory officials from the general offices at Dayton, Ohio when they come west to conduct a Pacific coast sales convention at San Francisco March 15, according to word received today by A. E. Cunningham of People's Electric store, Medford Frigidaire dealers. A special train carrying 250 officials and dealers will arrive in Medford on March 14th on its way to San Francisco and Mr. Cunningham is making arrangements for entertainment for the visitors during their brief stay in this city. Approximately 850 representatives of the organization will attend the San Francisco meeting, the local dealer has been informed. The convention program will be in charge of R. P. Callaway, Dayton, Ohio, manager of branches.

The party that will come to the Pacific coast already has conducted nine regional meetings in various cities of the United States and Canada, reaching approximately 10,000 members of the field organization. Orders totaling \$7,000,000 were turned in at these conventions. In commenting on the showing made during these meetings, Mr. Brochler stated that prospects point to a business increase during 1929, of at least 25 per cent. "Although Frigidaire sales during 1928 were greater in volume than ever before, 1929 will see that mark increased," he said. "Business in January this year showed an increase of 30 per cent over the same month last year."

At the conclusion of the San Francisco convention, a number of the Frigidaire executives in the party will visit the organization's branches, on the Pacific coast, having a first hand investigation of business conditions and plan for increased activity in 1929. COURT WILL HEAR PETITION READING FOR MIDWAY ROAD

The first reading of the petition for the construction of the Midway highway, extending from the Dr. C. L. Sweeney gate on the Pacific highway to Bybee bridge will be conducted by Bybee bridge will be conducted by the county court at the regular session tomorrow. The second reading will occur the following Wednesday, March 13, when it is expected both sides of the issue will be heard. According to members of the county court, there is very little opposition to the road, the chief point being a difference of opinion over the amount of the right-of-way damages. The road viewers have estimated it at \$250,000. Some of the property owners hold this is not enough.

The general road fund program of the county will not be formulated until after the Midway highway is settled, one way or another. Its construction is held to be an important public work, furnishing a shorter route to this city for the Sams Valley district and intermediate orchardists and dairymen, and a direct route from this city to the proposed new airport, for which \$120,000 will be voted upon by the voters of this city April 2.
