The reserved seats were reported today to be selling fast, the sale being stimulated by reserved seats for this bout being the same price as general admission. ### POSTOFFICE TO ISSUE RETURN MAIL PERMITS

A boon for business concerns of Medford is that the Medford postoffice has just received authorization from the postmaster general's office to issue permits to advertisers for mailing business reply cards or envelopes.

The permit, when obtained at the postoffice, provides for the remitting of such cards or envelopes by the recipient without postage affixed, the return postage to be paid by the original mailer. This feature, which has been in vogue for some time past at many postoffices, is gaining in popularity throughout the United States, it is said.

Of course, the remitted card or envelope only benefits when the recipient of such mails it back to the sender. If he does not the sender or advertiser is out of luck, and is out the small price charged in sending out the original letter with return postal card or envelope affixed.

### COMPANY BUYS LOCAL PIGGLY WIGGLY STORE

After having leased the local Piggly Wiggly store a year ago, Roy Thomas last Saturday disposed of his interests back to the Piggly Wiggly company, which was recently reorganized. Mr. Thomas gave up possession of the store last Monday, but plans to continue his residence in this city. The Northwest Piggly Wiggly company operates 50 stores in Oregon and has plans of opening 20 more during the ensuing year.

The local store is to have all new stock of the Gold Bar brand and will be managed by Jack Althouse, here for the past three and one-half years. G. G. Hatch, district superintendent, and George Mellinck, general manager of the company, were in Medford several days in connection with the deal and left this forenoon for Portland. T. J. Hampson, who has been in the employ of the store since it was opened, will continue his services for the time being at least.

### Coach Names Team Captain

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—To John E. Dresnar of Irwin, Pa., falls the honor of being the first basketball captain to be selected by the coaches rather than by the team at Carnegie Tech. Dresnar, guard and center, and a sophomore, will captain the 1929 Carnegie outfit.

A year ago the Carnegie athletic council accepted the suggestion of Judge Walter P. Steffen of Chicago, advisory coach, that captains be named by the coaches. He pointed out that a captain selected by the team might be the most popular man on the squad, but might lack field generalship. Under the new system a captain may be replaced at any time during the season if the coaches see fit.

Carnegie football teams will not be entirely subdued in selecting captains. Provision is made that at the end of a season the squad may name an honorary captain.

Negotiations are under way for a game this week-end between the Medford high school and the Alumni basketball teams. The game, if agreed upon, will be the farewell appearance as high school basketball players of Ted McDonald, Al Melvin, Bill Morgan, Clifford Garnett and Bill Bowerman. When they return from the state tournament, they will be through with high school athletics.

The Alumni team, composed of former high school stars, is the only team that has been able to give the southern Oregon champions much of a tussle, and Coach Cullison is anxious to secure the game, to put his charges in shape for the Salem meet.

All the Medford players are in good shape, though Morgan is banged up with a couple of sore ribs, sustained in the first Ashland game, and Melvin is having some trouble with his legs. The rest of the squad is in first class condition. The squad has not been definitely decided upon for the tournament, but it will probably comprise: Melvin, Bowerman, McDonald, Morgan and Garnett, the regular first string, and Anderson, Pierson and C. Thomas as substitutes.

The team plans to leave by auto next Tuesday noon, working out Tuesday evening in the University of Oregon gymnasium, and arrive in Salem early Wednesday morning. Leaving here Tuesday night by train, and traveling direct to Salem is also under consideration.

Over a hundred southern Oregon fans will attend the tournament, from the start, and twice that many local citizens will see the final games, if Medford goes to the finals or semi-finals.

It is not likely that Medford will play the secondary county champions as Phoenix and Central Point are tied for the honors, and will be busy with a tournament of their own.
