

### CRATER PARK MEN PREPARE FOR NEW VACATION SEASON

The Crater National Forest headquarters office here is fast getting in readiness for the late spring, summer and fall season in this vast forest territory, and one of these moves is one preparing to install 100 newly painted and constructed signs. It has been five years or more since newly painted signs were installed, at which time only about 200 were installed. Since that time the addition of new forest territory and changes made in the trails and roads throughout the forest have made the additional signs necessary.

The signs will all be standard national forest signs in use in the Pacific northwest, in size, posts and lettering, and will be of a different color scheme than has been in use. The sixty border signs, and other special signs will all be dark green in color, instead of in a combination of cream and green as heretofore, will have 1 1/2 inch letters and will be painted in Portland by a professional painting concern.

The directory signs to trails and roads and the cautionary and warning signs will be in black and white instead of old colors of green and white, will have one-inch lettering, and one-fourth inch border. These signs will be painted here in the Crater National Forest warehouse by the forest rangers and other attaches.

Hugh B. Rankin, supervisor of the forest, Norman Whit, assistant supervisor, W. J. Sprout, local forest examiner, and Gene Rogers, ranger, held a conference in the basement of the federal building this morning on the new signs, where they should be placed, etc., which caused much apprehension among the other attaches of the building as a rumor has long been extant that one or all four of them are color blind.

Therefore much relief was felt when it became known that the signs would be of the standard kind in use in the national forests of the Pacific northwest. However, this does not relieve the apprehensions of the smokers of cigars and pipes who know from past experience that the Crater forestry officials have the nasty habit of locating non-smoke signs in the very spots that smokers love best.

### CLERK'S OFFICE PAYS PROFIT FOR COUNTY DURING YEAR PAST

The county clerk's office during 1928 was not only self-sustaining, but returned a profit to Jackson county, figures of the year's business revealed today. The sum of \$15,710.40 was received for fees during the year, meaning a monthly average of \$1305.20, or a daily average of \$44.55. Expenses for the year were \$14,480.25, nearly \$1000 less than the amount set aside for the office in the county budget.

Other figures at the clerk's office revealed that the sum of approximately \$559,654.74 was expended by the county, of which \$299,365.85 was used for road construction. The care of the poor cost \$24,231.25, exclusive of \$5195 expended for the widows' pensions. The circuit court, as the result of a costly grand jury investigation and trial last spring, expended \$12,686.59, considerably above its budget allowance of \$10,580.

McEwan has announced he will coach an all-western eleven scheduled to play an east-west football game in New York City December 14, this year. He was granted permission to coach the eleven by the executive council.

The East-West game will be under the supervision of the New York American Legion. McEwan will be at liberty to choose his players from the entire western section of the United States. The eastern coach probably will be Knute Rockne of Notre Dame.
